
Marsworth Airfield (south site) Development takes a step closer

On 7th June an outline planning application was verified on the Dacorum planning portal, ref: 22/01678/MOA*. The details are: 'Outline planning permission for demolition of existing buildings, structures and hardstanding to enable the erection of up to 320 residential (Use Class C3), a primary school, a local centre comprising community facilities (Use Class F2) and a rural enterprise hub (Use Class E) together with a transport mobility hub, public open space, drainage, landscaping and ancillary infrastructure. New vehicular and pedestrian access off Long Marston Road with all other matters (including other means of access) reserved.

While this is not the full planning application for the housing development, if approved the site will be cleared in preparation and a full planning application will follow, giving full technical details.

The airfield spans two counties, Herts - Dacorum Borough Council planning for Tring Rural parish and Bucks planning for Marsworth parish in which the bulk of the site is located. An identical

application was simultaneously submitted to Bucks but this is yet to be verified (at the time of writing) due to a legal issue. We understand the Dacorum application was premature and it should have gone to Bucks first.

Both counties have to consider the application and any decision has to be in conjunction with each other, with the greater responsibility falling to Bucks as it has the largest piece of the site within its boundary.

Parish Council meeting June 2022 – reporter's highlights

The full minutes can be viewed on the parish website at www.marsworth.org.uk.

Planning

The MPC had three major planning applications to consider and discuss this month:

Marsworth Airfield ref: 22/01678/MOA. - 320 new homes — see front page for full story. We have until 12th July to respond on the Dacorum planning portal, however the Bucks application is currently not verified so the deadline date for responses is not yet known. Once verified, Bucks will drive the process so the "clock can't start ticking until it is in Bucks planning".

MPC comments: Concerns include impact on traffic in the area; sustainability of a large development in the middle of a rural area; bus service cannot be guaranteed beyond the developers' funding period; issue with buses going over the little bridges.

Marshcroft Development, Tring (Dacorum) ref: 22/01187/MOA - 1400 new homes

Land off Church Road, Ivinghoe ref: 22/01783/APP - 68 new homes. This application is revised from the 72 homes previously planned. We are reminded that any comments made on the previous application will not be carried over so do please add your comments to the new application. Deadline for comments is 5th July.

All of the above applications are within the 12.6km zone on the Chilterns Beechwoods protection programme so will require mitigation. The best mitigation would be essentially that any new residents will not go to Ashridge for their recreation – an impossible scenario!

Bucks Councillors - Ivinghoe Ward

Our Bucks councillors present at the meeting were asked to give updates on the following:

- The White Lion no progress, however there may be a new issue causing delay - a manhole cover in the carpark has been noted. Whose responsibility it is, is being investigated.
- Aylesbury Truck Hire at Marsworth Airfield awaiting information
- Chiltern Beechwoods Special Area of Conservation document and its impact on planning applications see above. (This was in part cited as reason for refusal to Old Manor (Barn) recent planning application amendment).
- Land at Marsworth Airfield see above
- Airfield enforcement in general some industries appear to have planning permission to be there, but others may not. It is not clear at this stage, which are which and whether any or all are paying the necessary business rates, or hold a licence to operate from that site.

Speeding

The new Speed Indicator Device (SID) has been installed but a fault is being investigated – the screen information to approaching drivers is correct but it is not recording correctly at the moment.

Reminder – please email the Parish Clerk to request a speed limit bin sticker – to date only one has been requested. It was noted that bins are only out once a week but - every little helps!

Recreation Ground

On a recent inspection there was evidence of golf being played at the Rec. **This is not allowed.**

Running track – discussions continue as to the viability and practicality - only one public response received who said they would prefer money to be spent on a perimeter fence. **What is your view?**Email parishclerk@marsworth.org.uk.

Steam Rally

Short report given – extremely successful fundraising event with record attendance. Thanks given to the Kempster family and all the volunteers. (see report on page 7.)

Local reaction

Once news of this application spread around the villages a meeting was arranged at Wilstone Village Hall by Jean Fox, ex Tring Rural Parish Councillor who has a wealth of experience in rural planning. With a clear presentation, Jean took us through the process of commenting on the planning portal, and outlined the policies and other documents that are relevant to this application. The meeting was attended by around 50 people from mainly Marsworth, Wilstone, Long Marston and Gubblecote villages.

Object or Support the development proposal?

Before deciding, do some research. The application includes a Design and Access Statement (DAS) and a Planning Statement (PS). We were told the DAS is the most important one for us to study. Both these documents state their adherence to various national and local policies, but the planners will make their own assessment.

While most resident objections will be from a personal perspective i.e. how it will affect the area they live in, the objections that count will be policy, the first being The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF).

Other policies and statements to consider

VALP - The Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan

(Dacorum Local Plan will not be approved for a couple of years)

HELAA - Housing and Economic Land Availability Assessment - Bucks. A call for sites has been issued twice in 2021 and a wider call for sites has just been issued. Potential **brownfield sites are put forward by the developer or landowner and their suitability will then be assessed. The airfield development proposal was discounted as unsuitable under a HELAA in 2021 but has re-applied in 2022.

SHLAA - Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment - Dacorum

The deadline for comments on the Dacorum application is extended to 12th July from 27th June, due to its complexity and the delay for the Bucks application being verified.

Previous planning applications

A number of previous applications to develop Marsworth airfield (south site) for smaller developments, were not approved by AVDC (now within Bucks Unitary Council), who stated that the land should be returned to agricultural use.

Note 1: * Memorandum of Agreement

Note 2: ** A brownfield site refers to previously developed land, which is or was occupied by a permanent structure. A greenfield site refers to ANY land that has not been previously developed. This could be ancient woodland, grassland, or agricultural land.



Rural Rambler

A series of walks around Marsworth and the local countryside

No. 2 The Aylesbury Arm and Wilstone Village

Distance 3.5 miles (5.8 km) easy going, some muddy sections in wet weather.


This walk takes you along the Aylesbury Arm of the Grand Union Canal (GUC) to the attractive village of Wilstone and through open countryside with good views. There are plenty of opportunities for refreshments: Wilstone Village Shop (tea/coffee snacks - mornings only), the Half Moon Pub and the café at Meads Farm Shop.

Starting at Marsworth Church walk down Church Lane, over the bridge at the GUC and straight on to the next bridge. Immediately after the bridge (point A) turn right onto the Aylesbury Arm towpath and follow it to bridge 2 at Dixon's Gap. Taking the steps, pass under the bridge and walk for some 60yds to a gap in the hedge (B). Here the main route turns left and crosses the fields to Wilstone. Alternatively stay on the towpath to avoid the village, meeting the main route again at Wilstone Bridge (Bridge 3, E). Note that this short section of the towpath can be extremely wet and almost impassable at times.

If following the main route, take the path across the field to the gap in the next hedge after which turn left, passing the allotments on your right and into Rosebarn Lane. At the end of the lane (C) turn right into the heart of Wilstone. Pass the village shop and the pub on your right (stopping for refreshments if required!).

At the village hall (D) another alternative route is available: stay on the road to follow the main route to Wilstone Bridge (E) or take the track beside the recreation ground to rejoin the canal where turning left will return to the main route.

If staying on the road, pass the bungalows on the left and open field on the right (soon to be the site of further housing development) to Wilstone Bridge. Access the



towpath on the right hand side of the road and double back under the bridge to follow it opposite the new development at Wilstone Wharf, past the footbridge and on to canal bridge number 5 (F). Leave the towpath up a short rise and turn left through a small copse and cross the Wilstone Brook. Once again turn left and follow the path along the side of the field and brook to a gate at (G). Turn right, pass through a small gate and walk through another field (often cows) beside the brook. At the exit to this field (H) the path branches to the left at the large farm gate and meets a track which takes you back into the village via Chapel End Lane, passing some interesting old houses. At the main road turn right and walk approx. 160yds (careful, no footpath) to New Road. Turn left and, shortly after, turn right at the village pond then straight on through two gates to meet the B489 at Wilstone Green.

Keep left in front of the cottages (unless visiting Meads Farm Shop and café some 80yds to the right) and enter the next field with an orchard on your right. Follow the path beside the hedge (good views of Marsworth Church tower and Pitstone Hill in the distance) until it meets Wingrave Road (point I). Turn right (beware of traffic) and then left to take the path to the right of the fence beside and then diagonally across the next two fields.

Pass through the gate, cross the footbridge over Tring Brook and along the path to re-enter Watery Lane at the Mill House. Straight ahead takes you back over the bridges to Church Lane and the end of the walk.

Reaching the Heights

Everyone is fascinated by Everest, and I'm no different. It started as a family adventure between myself and my sister, Karen, and my two brothers. We had just lost my brother's wife in 2020 and thought we would bond on the hike to Base Camp; my brothers very quickly declined the invitation, but my sister and I decided we would give it a go.

I'm passionate about the LGBTQ+ and the challenges we still face even today, so o make the challenge mean even more I raised money for *Mermaids*. This amazing charity provides much needed support to transgender, nonbinary and gender-diverse young people and their families as they explore their gender identity, with an average 50-month waiting time for equivalent NHS services, Mermaids fills a critical gap in helping these people. The trek

We arrived in Kathmandu on 5th May and checked into our hotel, which was amazing. We knew that the luxury of the Ramada would be something that we should savour, as luxury is not how you describe our facilities on the mountain.

On Friday 7th May we left Kathmandu and flew to Lukla (elevation 1,338m). The airport in Lukla is renowned as one of the most dangerous in the world as the runway is extremely short and the plane

has to stop before it ends up in a hotel reception. I've never been in an aircraft that can descend and stop that fast.

Our group of six people, two from Yorkshire and one from Wales, and us flying Irish flags from our backpacks immediately started our trek and we headed to Phakding (elevation 2,652m 9km 4 hours) and our first tea house. From there we started one of our most challenging treks to Namche Bazaar (3,400m 12km 6 hours). We crossed the famous Hilary suspension bridge, which was amazing and after that we hiked up steep rocky trails that zig zagged up the mountain, it was the first of many of these.

On the next 6 hour trek and at 3,860m the lack of oxygen was being felt so we took it slowly. The trek continued the next day when one of our groups started to feel odd. Her

oxygen levels dropped to 50 (minimum should by 60-70) and her heart rate had rocketed to 135bpm. My sister and I stayed with her while others went for help. She was later helicoptered off the mountain and spent four days in hospital in Kathmandu. Scary stuff.

Two days later we were on our way to Everest Base Camp. The trek was hard, over a very rocky terrain, no real path, then we saw it; base camp. We made our way to Everest Base Camp rock, and now at 5,364m we took our photos. It was here we took a moment to set a small memorial for our sister-in-law on the rock, along with a huge Irish flag that was signed by family, friends and people we had met on the trek.

To answer some common questions;

 The food is amazing, all vegetarian because you don't want to eat meat that has travelled on the back of a yak for three days unless you have a very strong stomach.

- 2. Yes, there is a huge lack of oxygen and about 40% of people suffer altitude sickness and get flown to hospital. I didn't get any ill effects as I went slow and drank about 4 5 litres of water a day, and no I didn't take any medication to help.
- 3. Yes, the toilets are awful; some are ok, but literally a hole in a floor in a shed is the norm.
- 4. No, I didn't have a shower it was ten days before I was clean!
- Sleeping is relatively easy, but the teahouses are freezing, so you sleep in your clothes mostly, in a sleeping bag with a blanket or duvet over you - I slept with hat and gloves on once.
- What's the next challenge? I plan to summit Kilimanjaro in May 2024 with Jamie McAnsh, a man I met on the hike who is paralysed and did the hike on crutches.

Bucks Councillors' June report – extract

Senior political appointments confirmed at Buckinghamshire Council

Senior political appointments have been confirmed by Buckinghamshire Council following its Annual General Meeting on 18th May held at The Gateway offices in Aylesbury.

Martin Tett continues as Leader of the Council with his own set of portfolio responsibilities covering financial strategy, economic development, skills and employability, strategic infrastructure, policy and communications and the recovery plan for Buckinghamshire.

Two deputy leaders, Angela Macpherson and Gareth Williams, will continue to provide support in addition to their own cabinet responsibilities.

Please remember the right way to recycle electricals

Buckinghamshire residents are being given a timely reminder to take note of the right and



responsible way to recycle electrical items, following a recent fire on one of the council's refuse vehicles.

The recycling collection truck was on rounds in Amersham when it caught fire recently. Luckily the quick-thinking crew spotted the fire and acted promptly to contain it, calling on the Fire Service to attend. Once the fire was extinguished, the vehicle returned straight to the depot where the contents were tipped out and monitored to ensure no further fires broke out. The cause of the fire was found to be a laptop and battery, which had been placed in a recycling bin for collection. No-one was hurt in the incident and the vehicle was undamaged.

Across Buckinghamshire, batteries can be recycled at the kerbside if placed inside a standard carrier bag and left on top of the resident's recycling bin. They will then be collected by council crews on the day they normally empty the bin.

Small electrical items (broadly categorised as anything with a plug, battery or charger) should be taken to a local household recycling centre. These items include:

- Hair dryers
- Hair straighteners
- Electric toothbrushes
- · Games controllers
- Mobile phones and chargers
- Small electrical power tools

If an electrical item is larger than a shoe box (for example, microwave ovens and car batteries) it will also need to be taken to a local household recycling centre. Alternatively, residents can arrange for items to be collected, for a fee, using the council's bulky waste collection services.

Marsworth Neighbourhood Watch

There has been an increase in the number of suspicious vehicles (mostly vans) in Marsworth and the surrounding villages in recent weeks. Please be aware and mindful of who is in your street. It is difficult to identify the genuine delivery vehicles but if any are acting suspiciously or make you feel something is not quite right, record their registration details and vehicle type and report to the Police on 101 or online at www.thamesvalley.police.uk. Also let your street NHW co-ordinator know.

Home security while you are away

You may be planning a trip away during the summer holidays. The Community Safety team at Bucks Council (communitysafety@buckinghamshire.gov.uk) recommend the following to help prevent you becoming a victim of burglary whilst your home in unoccupied. (insert pic against this block of bullet points - optional)

- · Shut and lock all windows and doors
- Keep car and house keys out of reach from windows and doors
- Set timer switches to turn your lights on for when it gets dark
- Avoid leaving valuables in plain view eg laptops and tablets
- Set any house alarms
- Let your neighbours know you are away and ask them to keep a check on your home, put your bins in and out and clear any delivered post from view
- Lock side gates to prevent access to the rear of your property

- Keep any tools and ladders stored safely away in a locked garage
- Don't advertise that you are away and that your home is empty by 'checking in' on social media
- Resist uploading any holiday snaps to social media until you have returned home

Doorbell cameras/smart doorbells

As the name suggests these are doorbells with a camera that permits you to see who is at your door but also has the advantage of allowing you to speak remotely to your caller. It can connect to your home network to record your caller too.

Bucks and Surrey Trading Standards recommend these doorbells for the following reasons:

- It is an excellent visual deterrent, not just from burglary but also unwanted doorstep traders
- It can provide valuable video footage
- You can monitor your deliveries
- It can help you screen (and talk to) your visitors before answering the door
- · You can see who is coming and going
- If you set one up for a vulnerable member of your family, it's a great way for you to help safeguard them from unwanted callers when you aren't at the property yourself

Always make sure you buy a reputable brand. If you use one with motion sensors these are triggered by movement as well as the doorbell being rung. You will need a smart phone to access the doorbell and if you wish to store the recorded footage externally, think about the extra cost. Be mindful of what area your camera covers, it should only view your property's space and not any public ones.

Sticky Spicy Bangers

Thanks to Denise Cornwall for another tasty dish:

"As much as I like salads on these hot summer days, I do yearn for a hot dinner. This quick, one pan recipe is ideal and doesn't take too long. It is also suitable for meat eaters and vegetarians."



1 tbsp oil

400g pack of sausages (meat or vegetarian) cut into chunks

2 onions thinly sliced (I use red onion)

1tbsp coarse grain mustard

1tbsp honey

2 crushed garlic cloves

2 x 250g packs ready cooked rice (squeeze packets before adding them to separate the rice)

1 sliced red or green pepper or a mixture of the two 100g frozen peas

100g frozen sweetcorn, well drained from a tin will also be OK

Chopped parsley or coriander

Heat the oil over a low to medium heat, in a deep nonstick pan or wok. Add the sausages and cook for two to three mins, or until they are just nicely browning.

Add the onions and cook for five to six mins until soft.

Add the mustard, honey and garlic and continue to cook until mixture has evenly coated the sausages.

Add the rice, peppers, frozen peas and sweetcorn. Cook until all added ingredients are hot. Stir through the parsley or coriander before you serve or sprinkle some on the top when served up.

The Tring Anglers

A great start to Let's Fish and a meeting from the past

Pebble Brook after-school club started our first of six Thursday evening sessions of the spring. I always worry if we are going to catch fish and if everybody is going to enjoy themselves. The reservoir pound on the canal in the area of the picnic table provides the perfect site for this type of event. Certainly, for the BBQ on the last day, 14th July.

The first session was just about catching a fish; I am pleased to say that the six attendees did just that almost instantly. Perch, daddy ruffe, small roach and bream obliged despite the windy conditions. Future lessons include plumbing the depth, hooking bait, feeding bait, fish handling, setting up a rig and canal side behaviour.

Cooks Wharf is a really reliable spot this time of year and has a reasonable depth of water so a three metre whip is the tool of choice; many gudgeon and perch live close to the bank. I am delighted to say that all the participants that had booked in for a one hour session turned up and all caught fish. Although many of the fish were caught on maggot bait, small worms were also successful. Nearly all the youngsters were fishing for the first time so catching anything will cause excitement. We issue a 'First Fish' certificate which, as you can imagine is always popular!

We often get passing visitors during our Let's Fish sessions. Some are anglers asking about the club and its waters, others are curious members of the public. Some we see again on the bankside as club members, or they book the children for a coaching session. I had a surprise at the Cooks Wharf event as I was approached by somebody who looked familiar. It turned out that I took him for his first fishing lesson in 1975! He recognised me nearly 50 years later, confirmed when he heard my voice.

We talked about our trip to the Great Ouse at Bedford and his catch of roach and perch. Although his family moved away from the area in 1977 he has fished ever since that day. You never know how you can change people's lives. Even better, he is teaching his 15 year old grandson who is really keen.

The survey, run by the Association of Police and Crime Commissioners, will help inform police forces, the Home Office and local commissioners on any challenges around reporting to the police and assist in forming plans for the future.

The survey is open for responses until midnight on Sunday 24th July.

368 extra police officers since 2019

New numbers from the Government confirm that Thames Valley has benefitted from 368 additional police officers in less than three years.

We have been busy tidying up everything in preparation for our numerous visitors that will be coming this weekend. Extra tables put out. Rope inspection ticked off for the swing on the apple tree. Extra food purchased. We're nearly there.



The whole family look forward to coming to the Marsworth Steam Rally and of course it is also Father's Day, my day off. I am sure they come to visit us for that as well!

The Steam Rally is a special event for me, I catch up with all my old mates and their wonderful steam engines. It's hard to imagine that these giants were working machines and very much relied upon in the fields, mending the roads and for numerous other tasks. Once again, thanks to a team of folk who volunteer, put a lot of effort, time, and hard work into this event to make it the success that it is.

Another successful event was the Plant Sale at the church. I purchased some good quality plants from there. They have been planted and are coming along nicely. Well, we're heading for the longest day of the year. As I write it's only a few days away, Tuesday 21st June.

On average, June weatherwise is not too bad a month but as we move forward, and climate change does seem to have an impact on our gardening, it is becoming one of our driest months of the year. We're apparently hotter than Corfu today. A lot of our time will be taken up with watering. We have found that to be the case on our allotment where



everything is growing at an alarming rate, Including the weeds. Not so much in the flower garden as I put a good layer of mulch along with some good quality compost around the plants. All of this is helping to retain water and keep the ground moist.

It's a good idea to give all garden plants a mid-season feed or dressing of compost; this will continue to add nourishment to the ground that they are growing in.

In the allotment/veg patch we have been harvesting our broad beans and have just dug up our first early new potatoes. We're also eating lettuce, spring onions and a few early peas. There is nothing like the taste of fresh produce from your garden. Runner beans, carrots and beetroot will be ready in a few weeks. Courgettes and marrow plants have benefited from my own concoction of feed - comfrey and nettles chopped up and left in water for a few weeks. Add this to your watering can and you will notice the difference. Both grow along the hedgerows. It's also FREE - no cost at all for this little gem.

If you have flowers in terracotta pots, spray the pot as well as the plants. This type of pot will retain heat, dry out and draw moisture from the earth that is inside it. Spraying and soaking the pot will keep it cool and the earth inside moist.

If you have a pond, remember to keep your eye on the water level and keep it topped up. In very hot weather, I always keep our two bird baths full to the brim, making sure there is water for the birds.

Enjoy this lovely weather and make the most of your garden.

Ordnance Survey

Origins

The origins of the Ordnance Survey lie in the aftermath of the Jacobite rising of 1745 and the Battle of Culloden in 1746. The Duke of Cumberland realised that the British Army did not have a good map of the Scottish Highlands to locate dissenters so that they could be put on trial. In 1747 the compilation of a map of the Highlands was proposed to help to subjugate the clans, and as a result a map was produced at a scale of 1 inch to 1000 yards (1:36,000).

In 1790 the Board of Ordnance (a predecessor of part of the modern Ministry of Defence) began a national military survey starting with the south coast of England. In 1801 the first one inch to the mile (1:63,360 scale) map of Kent was published, with Essex following shortly afterwards.

In the next 20 years about a third of England and Wales was mapped at the same scale. By 1810 one inch to the mile maps of most of the south of England were completed. By 1840 the one inch survey

had covered all of Wales and all but the six northernmost counties of England.

It was hard work: Major Thomas Colby, the Director General of Ordnance Survey, walked 586 miles in 22 days on a reconnaissance in 1819. He was not only involved in the design of specialist measuring equipment; he also established a systematic collection of place names, and reorganised the map-making process to produce clear, accurate plans.

In 1855 the Board of Ordnance was abolished and the Ordnance Survey was placed under the War Office. In 1870 it was transferred to the Office of Works.

Great Britain "County Series"

After the Ordnance Survey published its first large-scale maps of Ireland in the mid-1830s, this led to calls for a similar six-inch to the mile survey in England and Wales. The development of the railways added to pressure that resulted in the Ordnance Survey Act 1841. This granted a right to enter property for the purpose of the survey.

It was realised how photography could be used to make maps of various scales cheaply and easily and photozincography was used to reduce the costs of map production.

From the 1840s, the Ordnance Survey concentrated on the Great Britain 'County Series'. A start was made on mapping the whole country, county by county, at six inches to the mile (1:10,560). In 1854 'twenty-five inch' maps were introduced with a scale of 1:2500 and



the six inch maps were then based on these. The first edition of the two scales was completed by the 1890s. Meanwhile, publication of the one-inch to the mile series for Great Britain was completed in 1891.

From the late 19th century to the early 1940s, the OS produced many 'restricted' versions of the County Series maps and other War Department sheets for War Office purposes, in a variety of large scales that included details of military significance such as dockyards, naval installations, fortifications and military camps.

City and town mapping, 19th and early 20th century

From 1840 the six-inch standard was adopted in Great Britain for the un-surveyed northern counties and the 1:1056 scale also began to be adopted for urban surveys. Between 1842 and 1895 some 400 towns were mapped.

20th century

During World War I the Ordnance Survey was involved in preparing maps of France and Belgium. During World War II, many more maps were created.

In 1935 the Davidson Committee was established to review the Ordnance Survey's future. The retriangulation of Great Britain was started, an immense task involving the erection of concrete triangulation pillars ('trig points') on prominent hilltops as infallible positions for theodolites.

The Davidson Committee's final report set the Ordnance Survey on course for the 20th century. The metric national grid reference system was launched and a 1:25000-scale series of maps was introduced. The one-inch maps continued to be produced until the 1970s, when they were superseded by the 1:50000-scale series.

In 1995 Ordnance Survey digitised the last of about 230,000 maps, making the United Kingdom the first country in the world to complete a programme of large-scale electronic mapping.

By the late 1990s technological developments had eliminated the need for vast areas for storing maps and for making printing plates by hand. The digitising programme had replaced the need for printing large-scale maps, while computer-to-plate technology had also rendered photographic platemaking obsolete.

21st century

In 2010 Ordnance Survey printing and warehouse operations were outsourced, ending over 200 years of in-house printing.

In 2015 the organisation became a government-owned limited company. The organisation remains fully owned by the UK government.

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
