Marsworth Airfield south site development – latest news

Our Ivinghoe Ward councillors successfully negotiated on our behalf, for an extension to the deadline for comments on the planning application (ref 22/02189/AOP) to take account of holidays and to give time for a thorough consideration of this complex application. Marsworth Parish Council invited residents to have their say at the MPC meeting on 8th August, before submitting its final response by the new deadline of 18th August.

Turnout was disappointingly low - around 30 residents. It was felt that many people are unaware of what is going on and that a door-to-door leaflet drop was needed. This was immediately organised and executed by the parish clerk, Caroline Smith, with the help of the *Marsworth News* distribution team and our very own team member Graham Dickinson who quickly produced the leaflets.

Who are the developers?

Ainscough Strategic Land describes itself as "a family-owned business

focused on honesty, integrity, and trust which prides itself on helping create thriving communities with a commitment to sustainability and social value for new residents and existing communities."

Don't be fooled by the cosy image this statement portrays. In fact the Ainscough Group to which it belongs, is a multi-million pound, multi company group - in 2007 it sold its Crane Hire business (the largest in the UK) for over £250m.

Jenny Brow, Senior Planner for Ainscough Strategic Land said:

"This landmark development would create a sustainable new community built for the future, with an array of facilities and services for residents and space for wildlife and conservation.

"We are complying with local planning policies and are committed to meeting,

and where possible exceeding, the sustainability targets of the respective Local Plans. We look forward to working with local stakeholders and residents to ensure this development truly benefits the local community and environment."

Lack of sustainability is one of the main objections to the development of Marsworth Airfield south site so these seasoned developers would appear to have missed the mark in this case. Objectors do not see any social value in developing this site, for new residents nor for existing communities.

Objections on the planning portals of Dacorum and Aylesbury Vale describe how the airfield is the last place a 'sustainable' new village could be achieved, dropped into the middle of the countryside with its narrow, winding country roads and tiny canal bridges, surrounded by quaint historic villages, agriculture and greenfield land, and with a lack of social facilities or amenities in close proximity. Previous attempts to build on this land have failed for these reasons, and nothing has changed since they were rejected by the planners.

No local need for more houses

While the Government and Bucks Council support the idea of building more new homes on a continual basis across the UK it is left to the local councils to decide where those homes should be built. The current Aylesbury Vale Local Plan (which covers Marsworth) has stated its commitment to protect the character and integrity of its villages and does not require or desire large scale development in this part of the county. In particular, the airfield falls within the Marsworth parish which has more than fulfilled its obligation to build more homes.

The opportunity for the public to lodge comments, either to support or object to the development, has now passed so we await the decision from Dacorum and Bucks Councils. (Note: the majority of the proposed site sits within Bucks so the ultimate decision falls to them.) Marsworth Parish Council and Tring Rural Parish Council are committed to going all the way to fight off this latest attempt at large scale development of the airfield land.

The landowner clearly needs to capitalise on his investment so is it time to think outside the box about what could be a good use of this part* of the disused airfield while making money for the investor, but doesn't have a negative impact on its surroundings?

* The north Airfield site houses an industrial estate and the centre is agricultural.

Parish Council meeting July and August 2022 – reporter's highlights

The meeting scheduled for 11th July was cancelled at the last minute, due to holidays and Covid-19.

Planning

Marsworth Airfield South Site

The next meeting was held on 8th August 2022 and it started at 7pm to allow members of the public to come along and have their say on the planning application ref: 22/02189/AOP for developers Ainscough Strategic Land to build 320 houses on the Marsworth Airfield south site, on behalf of the site's owner, Skimmed Milk Supplies Limited Pension Fund. Around 30 people attended and the chairman Bob Kennedy ran through the Parish Council's draft response, adding any additional points raised by the residents. Those present were reminded that the deadline date for comments is 18th August and were urged to get their comments lodged by then. Information for guidance and MPC's full objection can be found on the Parish website.

A number of claims in the application were challenged, for instance whether the proposed site is in fact brownfield, as the developers claim. It does not appear to meet the criteria set out in the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) and Aylesbury Vale (prior to Bucks unitary council) recently confirmed it should be agricultural; "it would meet the Bucks shortfall of housing" – there is no shortfall; provision for a school on the site – have the relevant authorities been asked if there is a need, or indeed any funding? Many more examples were discussed.

A resident asked if it was possible to negotiate for fewer houses if 320 were not acceptable. They were reassured that this would not be normal. (Note: Two previous applications for fewer houses on the same site were refused.)

It was noted that quite a number of residents may not even know about this potential development so the Councillors agreed that a door-to-door leaflet drop was the best way to reach everyone in Marsworth.

White Lion Public House

Ivinghoe Ward Councillor Peter Brazier was present and he stated that there had been no update on the White Lion planning application. The time limit on the S215 notice issued to the owner last year had now expired and some instructions had not been complied with.

Aylesbury Truck Hire (on the airfield)

Data is awaited before further action is considered.

New Councillor

Following the advert to fill the councillor vacancy, the Councillors voted in the candidate, Keith Thomasson. He was invited to the front table and welcomed to MPC. (See bio on this page)

Speeding

The effectiveness of the new SID is still being monitored. Requests for a 30mph speed limit bin sticker from the Parish Clerk had been very disappointing considering the number of complaints that had been made regarding speeding.

Dog Poo

An increase in dog poo around the village was discussed and it was not felt that more poo bins would resolve the issue. (Note: Dog waste is allowed in ordinary waste bins, not only bins specifically for dogs.) The PC will seek advice from the Dog Warden.

Councillor Keith Thomasson

Keith has lived in Marsworth with his wife Valerie since 1994, having lived in Aylesbury, and prior to that Rayners Lane, near Harrow.

Keith worked for Buckinghamshire County Council for many years, before deciding in 2006 that 20 years was enough. He then ran an online retail business selling board games and card games for seven years, until proper retirement beckoned.



Except that proper retirement never seems to come... After closing the business, he joined the organising team for UK Games Expo, the largest board games convention in the UK (and third largest in the world), as Exhibitor Manager, liaising with the 400+ exhibitors that demonstrate, promote and sell at the exhibition, which takes place in three halls of the National Exhibition Centre in Birmingham around the beginning of June.

During that time he was also involved with Tring U3A as a founder member, Treasurer, and subsequently Chairman.

He also worked at the Red Lion for almost four years, from 2016 to 2020, as barman and deputy landlord when required.



Aston Clinton traffic calming

Buckinghamshire Council is proposing to introduce traffic calming measures along London Road (A41 old road) in Aston Clinton.

This commitment was always part of the developers' plans when new homes started to be built and residents and Aston Clinton Parish Council have complained that the road is being used as a "rat run" by people using the village as a short cut. Concerns are mounting, particularly regarding the speeds of some vehicles and pedestrians' safety.

The Aston Clinton bypass was opened in 2003 (as part of the A41 bypass Kings Langley to Aylesbury) and initial impact was positive. However, with more developments in the area the increased volume of traffic within the village has made the issues worse.



Public consultation is underway on the proposed traffic calming measures, and ends at midnight on Friday 16th September. 



Find out if you need planning permission

A new online self-service planning tool has been launched that enables anyone in Buckinghamshire to check if an idea they have for a project is likely to be allowed under national permitted development rights or whether it may require planning permission. The service is part of a national pilot by the Department for Levelling Up, Communities and Housing (DLUCH) to improve submitting and processing planning applications. This new service is now live in Buckinghamshire.

The new service works by doing a high-level check of the project against legislation and Geographic Information System (GIS) data to see if the project may fall under 'permitted development'. The service also warns if other types of consent, such as prior approval, tree consent or listed building consent may additionally be required.

This new service is available to use now on Buckinghamshire Council's website at https://www.buckinghamshire.gov.uk/planning-and-building-control/check-if-you-need-planning-permission.

Planning enforcement success for Buckinghamshire Council

Buckinghamshire Council has issued the highest number of planning enforcement notices outside of London according to the latest national data. A planning enforcement notice is issued when an individual or developer is found to be in breach of planning control – it might be that someone has carried out works without planning permission when it was needed, or that they've done something that wasn't within the granted permissions.

It's a key priority for Buckinghamshire Council to clamp down on breaches of planning control – the process exists to make sure any work or development is appropriate and legal within nationally set planning laws. In Buckinghamshire we're serving notices and taking early action against any breaches of planning control which is part of the reason we're standing out for taking action. The aim is to intervene at the earliest opportunity to seek a remedy for the planning breach as quickly as we can.

Buckinghamshire Council has also served the highest number of 'breaches of condition' notices in the whole country – this is where individuals or developers have failed to adhere to conditions set out when planning permission for their project was granted.

Opportunity Bucks' – 'Levelling Up' in Buckinghamshire

Buckinghamshire Council's Cabinet has this week approved a new programme aimed at promoting opportunity for all in the county. 'Opportunity Bucks' aims to help all residents access the fantastic opportunities on offer in Buckinghamshire where education, skills, work, living standards and health are concerned.

Following the government's 'Levelling Up' White Paper earlier this year, Buckinghamshire Council has carried out extensive work to draw up a local approach to promote

better opportunity for everyone. The result is our new programme "Opportunity Bucks – Succeeding for All."

The approach will vary by area depending on what is most important locally and will initially focus on creating action plans for ten wards where outcomes for residents are poorer than in other parts of the county. The ten wards are in parts of Aylesbury, High Wycombe and Chesham.

This is a long-term piece of work and importantly is a partnership approach with other key stakeholders in the local areas such as housing associations, local businesses, voluntary and community groups, schools, and charitable organisations. Activities will be locally led by neighbourhood Community Boards along with local councillors.

'Check a Website' is a new, easyto-use online tool which can help you determine whether a website is likely to be legitimate or a scam before you visit it. It is hoped this will prevent thousands of people in the UK falling victim to online scams every year

To use, simply type in the address of the website you want to check and your results will appear within seconds. To try it out visit www.getsafeonline.org/checkawebsite/

Do you feel safe everywhere?

Did you know you can now tell the Community Safety Partnership (CSP) about areas where you feel unsafe? The CSP is part of the local Council that work with other organisations on issues such as emergency planning for flooding and snow, anti-social behaviour and food hygiene certification.

The "StreetSafe" online tool allows you to flag areas on a map where you feel unsafe and explain why. This could be due to poor street lighting, behaviour you may have experienced or witnessed there, or something else.



You can make a report about an area in the Thames Valley, or indeed somewhere else you have visited in the UK. Reports are then sent to the police force responsible for that area. All reports are anonymous, and they are reviewed by local agencies to identify areas that need improvement.

Great News for the Wendover Canal

The Wendover Canal team are very pleased to have received a large amount of



funding from Tring Town Council, £20,000, in partnership with Dacorum Borough Council, £135,000, for the canal restoration project. The grants have been matched with a legacy from a former resident of Little Tring.

The restoration project includes the removal of 5,500 cubic metres of household waste. This was tipped for ten years from 1918 to 1928 into the closed canal at Little Tring by the then Tring Urban District Council.



Final clearance?!

The tip waste consists mainly of ash and stretches for 270 metres. It's one of the final barriers to rewatering the Wendover Canal, and its removal will be a significant milestone. It will also allow the re-opening of the towpath through the area currently containing the waste, avoiding the need for walkers, runners and cyclists to divert down the busy Little Tring Road. For the first time in 100 years, there will be a continuous towpath from the Grand Union Canal to Wendover.

Clive Johnson, Chair of Wendover Canal Trust, said: "We've been worrying for so many years how we could afford to safely and legally dispose of this waste blocking the canal, and I am looking forward to it being taken away this summer. I am really pleased that Dacorum Borough Council has been able to help us clear this barrier to local people enjoying this historic canal."

The inside story of 'Meeting and Greeting' at College Lake

I think most people are aware that 'Meeting and Greeting' has made a significant contribution to the finances of BBOWT by encouraging visitors to donate (and most do willingly donate), significantly raising the income to

BBOWT, compared with the old car park payment system.

But 'Meet and Greet' is much more than this. When visitors arrive at the entrance at the far end of the carpark we try to engage with them, telling them what has

changed, if they are regulars, and explaining the reserve background and features to those who have either never been or have not been for a long time.

If they have children with them, we can explain where best to entertain them. We do not just stay at the entrance, whenever we can we walk the reserve and engage with visitors who are walking round, explaining what they are looking at and answering any questions they might have.

We also litter pick, check the hides are tidy and the windows open for ventilation, check for any problems at the barn toilets and make sure that all the bird feeders are topped up. Volunteers also clean the feeders regularly to make sure the risks from fungus and viruses are managed as best we can, and we look out for any

hazards on the site. Some of the volunteers act as 'Guides in the Hides', and run the shop or help in the cafe when there are staff shortages. At weekends some volunteers act as Duty Wardens, either with staff warden backup (summer) or on their own (winter) with 'on call' backup. This means reserve staff can concentrate on tasks around the reserve rather than being on immediate call to cover visitor issues.

Having volunteers walking the reserve every day it is open provides far greater coverage than can be done by busy staff and provides flexibility.

Since the last time I sat down to write for Marsworth News it has not rained. This has brought back memories of the 1976 drought. There is definitely a similarity to how the weather is affecting the fishing and it remains to be seen if its influence on the next few years will be similar to what happened after 1976.

What can we say about the current water levels in our local canals and rivers? In my opinion the reservoirs have actually been lower at this time of year in some recent years and we are not suffering as much as other parts of the canal system.

However looking forward, the severest test will come after the bank holiday. The only local restriction to navigation is Lock 15 (Osier Bed) on the Aylesbury Arm providing access to the basin area. The lock is only in use between 1.30pm and 4.00pm and manned by two Canal & River Trust (CRT) staff (times may vary). It is possible that lock time limits may be imposed either side of the Tring Summit after the August bank holiday.

Currently the River Bulbourne is dry so cannot provide the required water from the Berkhamsted area. The Marsworth Flight is fed by the reservoirs which are being carefully husbanded by the local CRT team. I remember the Summit and Flight level being reduced by 15 inches during previous drought conditions. If these conditions persist, as they certainly will if there is a continued lack of rain, then the canal will become heavily weeded, making angling difficult.

Despite the conditions, the canal fishing in our area has been excellent for both roach and perch. To catch roach I find baits like sweetcorn, hemp and tares (seeds) are particularly successful in these conditions. Worm for perch is always reliable and maggot will catch most species; from memory this was the same in 1976.

The Tring Anglers has nearly finished its 'Let's Fish' programme for the year, and it has been particularly successful. As well as our usual 'try fishing' sessions we had a memorable time with a group from the National Citizen Service (NCS). I had not previously heard of this organisation, but it's an excellent organisation aimed at 16-17 year olds and offers life experience and adventures. The CRT volunteer team organised a day with 16 of these young people at Marsworth, painting locks and other activities. A couple of hours angling provided something different to their usual relaxation period. Everybody caught fish, including a 2lb bream plus roach, perch and ruffe. It was refreshing to chat with these young people and find out that A level studies had not changed that much since my time 54 years ago. I hope we can make fishing with the NCS a regular event.

Are there even any angling benefits from the conditions of the last three months? Fish fry seem to be everywhere and we can hope that, as following 1976, that some species will have a prolific few years ahead. For me the 1980's were great years for chub, among other fish. The Aylesbury Arm seems to be full of rudd, which, although they must have spawned well in the last two or three years, have increased in size and spread further this year.

Just a comment on the River Thames. In 1976 it flowed backwards as water was pumped back up over the weir at Godstow (Oxford). The Tring Anglers are visiting Godstow on August 20th, I wonder if the same will happen again?



Yia-Yia Katina's Fasolà - Cypriot bean stew

This is my mum's recipe. Like most Mediterranean families the cooks rarely use scales (unless weighing themselves - and that is rare too!).



So it is generally a cup of this, a handful of that and a healthy sprinkling of whatever you fancy. Quite predictably the same recipe does not always turn out the same as the time before.

Sadly, I've not always had the time to write down the recipes, but my mum's memory lives on in the dishes I prepare although not that often, but made with love.

Ingredients:

3 cups cannellini beans
I stick celery cut into chunks
3-4 small potatoes cut in half
3-4 carrots cut into chunks
2 Knorr chicken or vegetable stock cubes
Half a cup loosely chopped parsley
Olive oil
1-2 lemons

Method:

Soak the beans in plenty of cold water overnight. Drain, rinse and place in a large saucepan of cold water and bring to the boil. Skim off any foam that rises to the top. Simmer for about 20 mins.

Add the stock cubes, celery, potatoes, and carrots. Simmer 20 - 30 mins until beans are tender. Ladle into large bowls, add a generous dollop of olive oil, a good squeeze of lemon and salt to taste. Garnish with a healthy amount of parsley.

Please note these are all rough guidelines as explained above.

A variation of this dish which my other half prefers is to add chopped fried onions (at least two) and two or more tablespoons of tomato puree when the beans are cooked. In effect a large saucepan of baked beans!

Ivinghoe Area Freight Zone approved

Following various consultations and amendments to the proposed Ivinghoe Area Freight Strategy, a meeting has finally been tabled at Buckinghamshire Council for 18th August with the Leader and Cabinet member for Transport Councillor Steve Broadbent, where the decision was made to go ahead.

The wards affected (the Zone) include Aston Clinton, Aston Clinton and Bierton, Ivinghoe, Wing.


It is recommended that a) the Leader of the Council authorises the implementation of the Heavy Goods Vehicles Weight Restriction Zone (or Ivinghoe Area Freight Zone), as presented in the Statutory Consultation, and b) to implement the Weight Restriction detailed in the report submitted, that the Leader of the Council authorises the making of the relevant Traffic Regulation Order (TRO).

The reasons given for implementing the proposals are:

- To avoid danger to persons or other traffic using the road or any other road or for preventing the likelihood of any such danger arising.
- To preserve or improve the amenities of the area through which the road runs.

The effect of the TRO will be for all bridges within the Zone to carry a weight restriction of 7.5 tonnes. The effect is to protect the bridges and village roads from overuse of heavy goods vehicles which use the villages as no more than rat runs. It does not seek to prevent heavy goods vehicles from entering the villages for access only.

Following approval, it should take effect in Autumn 2022.


