Please do keep us informed of any new arrivals to Marsworth. We love to be able to welcome them.





Parish Council meeting October 2022 - highlights

Marsworth Airfield

Councillor Town reported that the Local Flood Authority had been unhappy with Ainscough's report and had objected to the Planning Application.

Footpaths at Lower End

TfB was obtaining quotes for the vegetation to be edged out along the pathways at Lower End. The footpath was also failing and it had been added to a list of similar schemes to be considered when capital funding was made available for footway surfacing.

Overgrown hedges restricting access along pathways

TfB had written to houses that were not complying with their obligation to keep pathways accessing, and - following an article in Marsworth News last month - these had now mostly been cut back.

One area still to be cut back was by the Bridge Weight Restriction sign which was obscured leading up from Lower End to The Red Lion.

Footbridge at the Mill House

This had now been repaired.

Dog Waste

Specific issues should be reported to the Parish Clerk (parishclerk@marsworth.org.uk) who would notify TfB to send out the Dog Warden to clear/clean the area.

Police Report

Theft of cooking oil from The Red Lion; Theft of two bicycles from an address in Norvic Road; and two suspicious males attending an address. One of the males said he was a roofer; when the occupant said he was not interested, he got into his van and a few minutes later, another male got out of the same van and said he had a delivery. Thames Valley Police has liaised with the pub regarding security and also visited other pubs to warn about the increase in oil thefts. September's report not received.

Bucks Councillors' October report – extracts

New planning guidance for Vale of Aylesbury unveiled

Buckinghamshire Council launched a consultation on three important planning guidance documents that, once adopted, will inform planning and development decisions in the former Aylesbury Vale district area.

These documents, known as supplementary planning documents (SPDs), provide detailed advice and guidance on policies in the Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan which was adopted by the council in September 2021.

The consultation will be open until 2nd November 2022.

Aylesbury Garden Town – South Aylesbury Masterplan

This masterplan document is intended to guide landowners, developers, the public and the local planning authority in respect of environmental, social, economic and design objectives for the planning and development of the South Aylesbury area of the Aylesbury Garden Town, situated within Stoke Mandeville civil parish.

Design SPD

The aim of the design supplementary planning document is to ensure that new development across Aylesbury Vale is of the highest quality, is in context with its location, and is inclusive and sustainable. The document sets out clear principles and objectives that aim to inspire developers and designers and assist landowners, developers, applicants and planners in the process of delivering high quality and well-designed development.

Welcoming Spaces give a warm reception to all

The council is pledging to develop a network of Welcoming Spaces offering a variety of facilities around the county, with local partner organisations, where residents can come into safe and inclusive spaces, free of charge, to stay warm and enjoy a little company.

The scheme is kick-starting with the launch of Buckinghamshire's libraries and community libraries as the first of the Welcoming Spaces venues. Visitors will be welcome for as long as they wish during opening hours and can make use of facilities including free wifi and computer access. Library staff will also be on hand to offer information and support to visitors struggling with the effects of the cost of living crisis.

Household recycling centres switch to winter hours

Buckinghamshire Council's nine household recycling centres switched to winter opening hours on **Saturday 1st October**. The new opening hours are **9am to 4pm**. The household recycling centres will be operating the same days as normal.

New home energy schemes for Bucks residents

Hundreds of households in Buckinghamshire are set to benefit from new funding to make their homes more energy efficient as part of a joint project paid for by Central Government funding. The news will be welcomed by households across the county, many of whom are at risk of being pushed into fuel poverty due to rising fuel costs.

The grants are for households with a gross annual income of less than £30,000 or who are receiving eligible benefits, and properties must have an energy rating of D, E, F or G.

The scheme will benefit both homeowners and those who rent privately. The new grant funding will potentially help more than 400 households in the county, and includes properties that are 'off grid', currently using an alternative energy supply, such as oil.

For owner occupiers, the work will be carried out for free. However, for rental properties (whether private or social), the landlord will be expected to pay at least one third of the cost towards the work.

Cost of Living Payment Scams:

Another payment, another scam! Please remember your energy company will never ask for your bank or personal details by phone, letter or email, even if they say there is a refund payment for you. "Always scan for a scam".

Fireworks

Bonfire Night is approaching. There are strict laws in the UK governing fireworks.

Fireworks can be used in the UK any time from 7am to 11pm. Exceptions are:

- Bonfire night: 7am to midnight
- New Year's Eve, Diwali and Chinese New Year: 7am to 1am the following day They can only be purchased on specified days around these events.

There are four categories of fireworks:

- category 1: 'Throwdown fireworks' including firecrackers, bangers and party poppers
- categories 2 and 3: 'Adult fireworks' available in shops
- category 4: Professional display fireworks available from specialist suppliers

Who can use fireworks is regulated by The Fireworks Regulations 2004 and The Pyrotechnic Articles (Safety) Regulations 2015:

- anyone over 18 can buy, carry or use category one, two and three fireworks
- anyone over 16 can only buy, carry or use category one fireworks
- anyone over 12 can buy Christmas crackers
- only licensed professionals can buy, carry and use category 4 fireworks
- unless part of an organised event by licensed professionals, fireworks cannot be used on the street or in a public place
- it's an offence to throw or set off any firework (including sparklers and category 1 fireworks) in or into any highway, street, thoroughfare or public space.

If you are planning a display in your garden, please visit www.bucksfire.gov.uk/safety-hub/fireworks and follow their advice.

Anyone using fireworks in a dangerous or threatening manner should be reported to Thames Valley Police.

Now the clocks have gone back for this winter please remember to make your house look occupied when you are out. Sadly, burglars see the extra hours of darkness as an opportunity to increase their crime.

The Tring Anglers

The big perch have appeared at Cook's Wharf and other parts of the canal. You can fish all summer and only catch smaller perch and then suddenly fish over two pound appear in the autumn. I wonder where they go the rest of the year? It is likely that they are still close by all year round but dietary habits make them less likely to fall to an angler's regular baits. Autumn is the time of year when most animals stock up to survive the winter and will try anything that seems edible.

A two pound plus perch will take five or six years to reach this weight and they live around 12-15 years. As with all wild creatures, size and development will depend on the quality of the habitat.

Not far from Cook's Wharf and feeding the Grand Union Canal is Wilstone Reservoir, home of the national perch record 6lb 3oz, caught by esteemed local angler Ken Brown. As far as I know Ken is also the only angler to catch two 5lb perch on the same day, also from Tring reservoirs

There is a book entitled "The Biggest Fish of All" about perch fishing. The preface includes: "Chapters have been prepared on many waters including the Thames, the Upper Great Ouse, the Kennet, the Trent, the Derbyshire Derwent and Tring reservoirs."

I contributed a couple of sentences on Tring reservoirs, sadly not for my angling prowess, but because I was bailiff at the time (2011). I should have bought a copy, as I find now that this limited edition book will cost me £160.

In my October article I wrote about a young angler called Maja from Pebble Brook School, Aylesbury.

Her adventures continue with a request from the organisers of the Commonwealth Games fishing event, again on the Shropshire Union canal near Market Drayton on Saturday 22nd October. An email request to Simon Mottram, a local and one of our best canal match anglers, produced some sound advice for fishing now the canal can be more difficult to catch fish than our last visit.

Using some of Simon's advice we had a last practice session on our local canal at Cook's Wharf. Despite a slow start we managed some skimmer bream, roach and perch. A complete surprise was Maya hooking a large perch which we managed to land. It weighed 2lb 8oz and provided great excitement; such a fish from the 'Shroppy' next week would be most welcome. We discovered that another angler fishing around the bend, back at the car park swims, also had a large perch. A good day to go fishing for perch, it seemed.

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Rural Rambler By Steve

A series of walks around Marsworth and the local countryside.

No. 4: The Wendover Canal to Drayton Beauchamp

Distance: Main route 5.1 miles, 8.3 km; alternative route 3.5 miles, 5.6 km. Easy going, one busy road crossing.

The Wendover Arm of the Grand Union Canal, recently informally renamed The Wendover Canal, was started in 1793 to provide water to the Grand Union Canal from the springs at Wendover. However it was never watertight and in the 1880s it was closed to navigation beyond Little Tring, the water for the Grand Union being carried by a pipe along the canal route to feed the reservoirs near Marsworth, then being pumped into the remaining section of the Wendover Arm to top up the Grand Union. The Wendover Canal Trust (https://wendovercanal.org.uk/) is restoring the canal and some of its outstanding restoration work can be seen along the canal.

This month's walk follows the early part of last month's walk as far as Tringford Pumping Station. Follow the route as described in the 'Woods and Water' walk (in the October issue) to Point C.

From Tringford Pumping Station take the gravel path in front of the cottages to Little Tring Road. Turn right along the footpath behind the hedge then carefully cross the road, bearing right some 20m to the entrance of the Wendover Canal. Go through the gate and keep right to the towpath (Point D)

Follow the towpath. After approx. 600m a gate on the right marks a path through trees to Wilstone Reservoir (Point E). This offers an alternative, shorter walk (see below).


The main walk continues along the towpath, passing under the Drayton Beauchamp road bridge. After another 150m climb the embankment steps leading to St Mary the Virgin church at Drayton Beauchamp (Point F). Exit the churchyard via the front gate and walk along the track, through the side gate at the field exit. After another 50m take the wooden gate on the left and traverse the field. On reaching the road (Point G) turn left, then cross the road to enter the field opposite. The path crosses this and the next field, bringing you to the woodland at the rear of Wilstone Reservoir (Point H).

Keeping left and crossing a small stream, enter the woodland and follow the path through the woods and out onto the north embankment of the reservoir. Walk along the embankment, ignoring the steps down to the car park, and turn onto the eastern side. Steps on the left (Point I) take you diagonally down the embankment and, keeping left at the bottom, a couple of gates lead you to a path around the perimeter of Meads Farm Shop.

If taking the alternative route go through the gate (at Point E) and follow the path downhill, turning right at the bottom and following the track, bearing left to take the embankment path along the eastern side of Wilstone Reservoir until you come to the steps at (Point I) and re-join the main route.

Stop for refreshment at Meads Farmhouse Kitchen or take a detour to the Half Moon in Wilstone. Continuing on, carefully cross the road past the farmhouse and enter the footpath beside Wilstone Green cottages (Point J); enter the next field with an orchard on your right. Follow the path beside the hedge (good views of Marsworth Church tower and Pitstone Hill in the distance) until it meets Wingrave Road (point I).

Turn right (beware of traffic) and then left to take the path to the right of the fence beside and then diagonally across the next two fields. Pass through the gate, cross the recently restored footbridge over Tring Brook and along the path to re-enter Watery Lane at The Mill House. Straight ahead takes you back to the start at Marsworth Wharf.

How to protect yourself

- Energy Bill Discount: £400 off energy bills for households in Great Britain from October 2022.
 You do not need to apply for the scheme and you will not be asked for your bank details.
- Spotted a suspicious text message? Forward it to 7726 (free of charge). If you forward a text to 7726, your provider can investigate the origin of the text and arrange to block or ban the sender if it's found to be malicious.

Floodplain restoration to benefit wildlife

Wildlife is set to benefit from a major floodplain restoration project, which could bring back rare and endangered wetland plants and animals to a farm in Buckinghamshire.

Freshwater Habitats Trust and River Thame Conservation Trust have joined forces with farmer Rose Dale to create new freshwater and wetland habitats on her 220-acre organic farm in Chearsley, near Aylesbury. Work has begun on the site to create a 'floodplain wetland mosaic' habitat, which will include 15 new seasonal and permanent ponds and a backwater channel connected to the River Thame.

Co-hosts of the River Thame Catchment Partnership, Freshwater Habitats Trust and River Thame Conservation Trust are restoring floodplains to help reverse the decline of freshwater wildlife and contributing to the creation of the Freshwater Network in Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire. Creating this network will enable freshwater plants and animals to more easily disperse across the landscape and provide resilience to climate change and other environmental pressures.

At Manor Farm, the team has developed a complex of clean, unpolluted, freshwater ponds and shallow pools, creating habitats which are now rare in lowland England.

Because the ponds hold clean, unpolluted water, they will allow species that have disappeared from large parts of England, because of water pollution, to spread back into the Thame catchment.

The development will also provide benefits for the farm, including drinking water and more green forage for cattle during dry weather, Also, by 'roughening up' the floodplain, the team hopes to hold more water back on the floodplain when the river is in flood.

Freshwater Habitats Trust is also investigating the possibility of reintroducing rare water and wetland plants, which were once widespread




on Buckinghamshire's floodplains, to the site.

Hilary Phillips, Senior Project Officer with the River Thame Conservation Trust said: "This wetland habitat mosaic will benefit the environment, businesses, and the local community as well as increasing the area's biodiversity."



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

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
