

## Parish Council meeting November 2022 - highlights

#### **Public Participation:**

The Parish meeting had some members of the public attending this month, who were warmly welcomed.

Discussion took place on the potential for a Community Garden in Marsworth. The Parish Council (PC) supported the proposal. Although at an early stage, possible locations were mooted such as the areas of land opposite the village hall or by the side of Lukes Lea/ Vicarage Road. Another possibility could be a resident offering part of their front garden, if sufficiently large, or anyone with a spare piece of land. If residents have any ideas or suggestions, please initially contact the Parish Clerk.

Discussion then took place on the issue of speeding along Lower Icknield Way as residents had submitted a petition to the PC asking for assistance. In addition to the Speed Indicator Device (SID), the PC had again borrowed the Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign (MVAS) from Cheddington for a month or so. Data from these devices would be downloaded by the PC Chairman in time for next month's PC meeting on Monday 12th December.

Thames Valley Police (TVP) was very supportive of a Community Speed Watch initiative being set up in Marsworth but it would require support from the community to carry out the surveys. Interested residents should let the Parish Clerk know if they would like to be involved. An introductory meeting with TVP will take place at 7pm on Monday 9th January 2023 in the Village Hall (before the January PC meeting). Please let the Parish Clerk know if you would like to attend. Subsequent training would be online and all equipment for the Parish would be supplied free of charge by TVP. See notice on this page.

#### Planning application status

The Marshcroft Development in Tring (ref: 22/01187/ MOA) has been refused.

Ainscough has withdrawn its application for 320 new houses on the Marsworth airfield (ref: 22/02189/AOP) following over 200 objections including:

- numerous objections from Marsworth, Gubblecote and Wilstone residents:
- the Lead Local Flood Authority (LLFA) objecting due to insufficient information on the proposed surface water drainage scheme;
- Natural England objecting on lack of mitigation measures for an area within 12.6 kms of the Chilterns Beechwood Special Area of Conservation (SAC); and
- The Highways Authority.

Ainscough has stated on its website, however, that it will apply again for planning permission at the beginning of 2023, so the matter is far from resolved

#### Storage bin area near Red Lion Bridge

Sofas and mattresses were now being dumped in the boaters' refuse area by non-canal users. The PC had written to the Canal & River Trust (CRT) about clearing the excess. The CRT felt strongly that increased clean-up operations alone were not a sustainable solution to the problem, were a strain on its limited resources and sent the wrong message to those who regularly disposed of normal waste. Conversely, CRT had seen real successes where local communities had adopted a length of canal.

#### Salt bin


Does anyone remember there being a salt bin on the corner of Ship Lane and the Red Lion Bridge? Transport for Bucks (TfB) tells us that there was no record of there having been one, but we think there was. Does anyone by any chance have a photo of the bin in situ? The Parish Council will monitor over the winter whether there is a need to purchase a bin, bearing in mind there is already a bin outside the Red Lion

## Bucks Councillors' November report – extracts

#### New home energy schemes for Bucks residents

Hundreds of households in Buckinghamshire are set to benefit from new funding to make their homes more energy efficient as part of a joint project paid for by Central Government funding.

The grants are for households with a gross annual income of less than £30,000 or who are receiving eligible benefits, and properties must have an energy rating of D, E, F or G.

The scheme will benefit both homeowners and those who rent privately. The new grant includes properties that are 'off grid', currently using an alternative energy supply, such as oil.

For owner occupiers, the work will be carried out for free.

## Buckinghamshire Council agrees comprehensive Cost of Living package for residents

Buckinghamshire Council's Cabinet has formally agreed a wide-ranging package of support for residents this winter, including how it will spend £2.4 million of the government's Household Support Fund.

The proposals to support struggling Buckinghamshire residents are believed to be among some of the most comprehensive in the country and include initiatives such as a new local crisis fund, and the launch of a network of 'Welcoming Spaces' across Buckinghamshire.

## 'Money Matters' – have your say on Buckinghamshire Council's spending priorities for 2023/24

Like other councils across the UK, Buckinghamshire is in the process of setting its budget for 2023/24. 82% of the cost of providing all the Council's services comes from Council Tax – from paying for care packages to providing emergency accommodation for homeless people and vulnerable children, as well as the essential services everyone relies on like bin collections, road repairs and keeping streets and open spaces clean and safe.

'Money Matters' – the way for residents to tell us what matters most to them. The budget will pay for services such as:

- Pothole repairs, road maintenance and improvement
- The Council's energy costs from street lighting and operating machinery at household waste depots
- Care for vulnerable children, for example, those who've had to come into our care for their own safety and well-being
- Care for adults who need extra help and support
- Running libraries and leisure centres
- Support for residents facing hardship

The 'Money Matters' consultation sets out what proportion of the council's budget is currently spent on which services and invites you to tell us which services you would prioritise in a short survey.



### **Obituary - JOHN KEEN**

19 August 1939 - 13 September 2022

John was born in August 1939 just days before the outbreak of World War II. Home was Icknield Crescent in New Mill. He never knew his father, Fred, who died as a result of a bicycle accident on the road when John was only two.

John was brought up by Gladys, his mother and elder sister, Evelyn, supported by grandparents and extended family. A single mum without a

widow's pension, Gladys went out to work. The family led a very humble lifestyle and Gladys used her seamstress skills to supplement any income.

John attended Gravelly School (King Street in the Tring Triangle), Tring School as a junior (where Tring library now is) and later Mortimer Hill, but never really thrived, here. His first job as a youngster was to help out delivering milk for Ayers Dairy in New Mill. From an early age he was really into anything mechanical and garage work in Tring, Berkhamsted and Aylesbury led to working at Bert Bly's Garage, Lower End, Marsworth. Hence his introduction to Marsworth in 1966.

He met Pamela and they were married in Wigginton in 1961. Early married life saw them living in Western Road and Miswell Lane, Tring. When Bert retired, John took over the garage in Marsworth and eventually built his own house adjacent to the garage in Church Farm Lane.

He was a self-made man. Hard work saw the garage develop to become, at its height, a service



centre for Marsworth and local villages. Many loyal customers purchased a new Ford car with the latest registration every year or two.

It is worthy of note that both John and Evelyn (who ran her own florist shop in Tring), from little wealth as children, would develop their own businesses. John expanded his to include house building, and many properties off Vicarage Road

and in the surrounding area were built by his firm. A lorry haulage business supplemented this. Over the years local employment opportunities were offered, with some learning their trades who would go on to run their own successful businesses locally.

The family would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who served the businesses and customers for their support over the years.

John was a country boy at heart and there was always a German shepherd dog or two around in the home. He acquired grazing land and raised cattle. He commonly would not know just how many cows were "out on the range"! At one time he kept and showed a team of heavy working horses. A harvest hymn formed part of his funeral service which saw a large gathering.

As a young man John played football for Tring Corinthians whose home pitch off the Icknield Way in New Mill is just metres from where he was brought up. An interest in later life was to support Watford FC.

Nephew Paul Barber adds: As an uncle, John gave my late brother Steve a leg up in life and he was inspirational and generous of his time to me (without him would I have found football?)

He leaves two sons, Martin and Barry and three grandchildren.

#### **Craft Club**



### Marsworth Neighbourhood Watch

#### **Garden Bonfires**

Questions have been asked of NHW concerning domestic bonfires. Marsworth is not in a smoke control area but you must still adhere to the law regarding bonfires and

be mindful of the impact bonfires might have on your neighbours. It is amazing how far the smoke and smell can travel, and this can be particularly bad when burning anything that is damp, or on low cloud days.



You must not burn household and garden waste if it will cause pollution or harm people's health. It is recommended that garden waste is composted or recycled, and we are lucky in Marsworth to have the Aston Clinton Recycling Centre near us at College Road.

Householders can be fined if smoke from a fire drifts across a road and becomes a danger to traffic. If your neighbour's bonfire (residential or business) is a nuisance, you can report it to the Council which has a responsibility to investigate (under the Environmental Protection Act 1990) and, if necessary, issue an abatement notice. Failure to comply with this will result in a fine.

#### Number plate thefts

There has been an increase in reports of car number plate thefts in the Aylesbury Vale area. Often these plates are used on vehicles involved in crimes or to avoid parking or speeding tickets. The advice is to use security screws on your number



plates to make them harder to remove. If yours are stolen, please report it immediately on 101 or online.

#### **Garden safety**

Tall hedges and fences at the front of a property do not enhance security but potentially give burglars areas of cover and places to hide. It is recommended they are at a height where you have a clear view over the top, using taller fences at the side and rear of properties to make access more difficult. Prickly or barbed shrubbery can act as a natural and effective barrier.

#### **Priority Services Register**

Vulnerable residents, through their energy company, can sign up to be placed on the Priority Services Register. In the event of an issue with their supply they receive help and support ahead of others. #### Tring cafés

#### Remembrance

On the morning of Sunday 13th November, a congregation of more than 60 attended the annual Remembrance Sunday service. Annette Botting had put together the wonderfully meaningful service, where all those from Marsworth who gave their lives in both world wars were mentioned and a short history of those conflicts and the Falklands was given. Revd James Grainger-Smith led the two minute silence at 11am after wreaths had been laid on behalf of the Parish Council, The WI, The PCC, and children of the village - and a special wreath was laid by Olga, a Ukrainian currently living in Marsworth with her son Oleksandr, on behalf of all the people in Ukraine. ### HS2 route-wide injunction

The High Court has imposed an injunction to restrain unlawful trespass on and obstruction of access to land on the route of the HS2 Scheme. The order makes going onto HS2 land without permission or disrupting work a potential contempt of court.

Protests against the railway have cost HS2 an estimated £122 million nationally and an HS2 spokesperson said that the injunction was not intended to stop legitimate protest saying "instead, we hope the injunction will prevent the violence, intimidation, and criminal damage these protests have frequently caused, harming the HS2 project and those working on it, and costing the UK taxpayer millions of pounds."

#### **Concerns**

There have been a number of concerns about people going about legitimate business or pastimes mistakenly breaking the injunction and committing a criminal offence. Examples include walkers or ramblers walking across a footpath which crosses HS2 land, footpath maintenance

volunteers straying off the path to cut back hedgerows, organisations accessing the land for monitoring purposes such as the Chiltern Conservation Board and the Berks, Bucks & Oxon Wildlife Trust and even Buckinghamshire Council Officers going about their statutory business.

#### **Actions taken by Buckinghamshire Council**

Buckinghamshire Council has taken a number of actions to ensure that the route-wide injunction does not prevent people legitimately accessing or crossing HS2 land either for leisure or business purposes.

The Council sought legal advice on the implications of the route-wide injunction. It indicated that it should not affect the rights of the public using Public Rights of Way over HS2 land, making use of private rights of access over HS2 land or any person holding a freehold interest in land over which HS2 Ltd has taken temporary possession.

It is very unlikely that the injunction will affect the lawful activities of groups, such as the Chilterns Conservation Board continuing to undertake reasonable monitoring activities or members of the public, ramblers etc. from walking across HS2 land.

### The Tring Anglers

Merry Christmas, Happy New Year and a seasonal 'tight lines' to all the anglers out there. As I write, the weather has become more familiar for late autumn and early winter with a drop in temperature, high winds and considerable rainfall. I did enjoy a couple of pleasant angling sessions before the weather changed in the strangely warm conditions of late October and early November.

Like most anglers I really enjoy catching tench (of any size) and was fortunate enough to be invited to spend an afternoon fishing at the moat at Moat Farm near the Red Lion bridge. Club member Chris caught over six tench and some crucian carp using bread on the hook and what is known as the 'lift method' to capture his fish. Unlike conventional float fishing where when the fish takes the bait it pulls the float under the water, in the lift

method when the fish takes the bait the float will come upwards out of the water and then lie flat on the surface. This is because the shot weights cocking the float are resting on the bottom close to the hook bait. Tench often feed by sucking the bait off the bottom from a tails up position, resulting in the float lifting up. However, my more conventional approach did eventually produce the desired tench, plus

loads of rudd and roach. What a peaceful and attractive place to fish, I hope that I receive another invitation in the future!

My second tench was caught on the River Great Ouse at Olney and was a bit more of a surprise. Although a relatively common catch in parts of the river in the spring and

summer, a November fish is rare. I was really pleased with such a fish. The first tench I ever caught was from the River Ouse at St Neots; it was also the biggest fish I had caught at that time, nearly 60 years ago. Strangely, a couple of years later I caught two from Eaton Socon, near St Neots, to win my first ever club match. It was a bitterly cold November day with a severe frost, but in those days the hot water outlet from Barford power station made the river ten degrees warmer than it would have been otherwise which kept the tench feeding despite the chilly weather.

In my last article I mentioned that Maja from Pebblebrook School had been chosen for the Commonwealth Games team angling competition. The Shropshire Union canal again proved to be reliable venue. Maja caught over 50 small roach, skimmer bream, perch and gudgeon which weighed in at 1.48kg to come in at eighth place out of 51 top class anglers - a great result. We look forward to next year's 'Let's Fish' events, and although the Commonwealth Games will not take place, we plan to widen the invitation to all countries.

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#### Rural Rambler By Steve

A series of walks around Marsworth and the local countryside.

#### No. 5 Pitstone Hill and Albury Nowers

This month our walk starts a little further from home commencing from the car park on Stocks Road near Pitstone Hill. To get there, drive along the B488 through Pitstone and Ivinghoe villages and follow the road past Pitstone Windmill to the sharp right turn, Stocks Rd is straight ahead on the bend. Drive along Stocks Rd for nearly half a mile and the car park is on the right

Distance 4.5 miles, hilly (c. 250 ft of elevation) and some slippery sections when wet.

Starting from the car park, cross the road into the field opposite and follow the obvious path along the fence line. At the corner of the fence turn right and at the next bend in the fence (Point A) bear left up the gentle incline (can be slippery). Follow the path until a gate is reached, pass through the gate and immediately turn right onto a subsidiary path (B) marked by a yellow capped post opposite. The start of this path is not obvious but after walking around the fallen tree trunk it becomes clear. Follow the path downhill through the trees to Down Farm. Alternatively, to avoid this hill, bear right at (A) and follow the grassy track along the fence line to the farm.


Walk straight on through the farmyard and take the farm road out. After just a few yards turn left into the field (C), signs on fence posts mark this as a 'permissive path'. This path can now be followed along the edge of the field to a gate and a private house where it takes a dogleg left into the next field. Keep close to the house boundary and after 0.3 mile access to a tarmac road is available on the right (D). Follow this small road until, at the next gate (E), a signpost points right where the footpath traverses the adjacent fields. Walk across the fields, taking care not to widen the path unnecessarily into the crops, until you reach a track/bridleway (F). Turn right and stay on this track until it meets Stocks Rd at a stable yard (G).

At this point it is possible to shorten the walk by turning right and walking back to the car park along Stocks Road. However the road is narrow and without a footpath. This alternative is not therefore recommended.

Carefully cross the road and enter the trees, the path is signposted to Tring Station and after 100yds or so leaves the woodland and runs along the edge of Stocks Golf Course with woods on your right. Keep to the path until you reach a plethora of signposts showing footpaths and the 6th and 16th tees (H). Here you should turn right into the woods and follow the path through the trees. You will pass a National Trust/Ashridge Estate sign, currently leaning against a tree, on your right. Stay on the path through the trees until you reach The Ridgeway long distance path (I). This is clearly indicated and you should again turn right, uphill on some steps, onto The Ridgeway path.

We now follow The Ridgeway through the woods of Albury Nowers Nature Reserve (note the informative signs about the reserve beside the path), eventually leaving the woods through a gate at Point (J). In this area the path follows earthworks comprising a ditch and ridge, this is Grim's Ditch, an ancient - possibly Iron Age - feature widespread across our part of the Chilterns. Follow The Ridgeway path uphill onto Pitstone Hill, taking care if wet as the bare chalk on the path can be slippery.

This path takes you along the ridge and over Pitstone Hill, providing great views across the Vale of Aylesbury and finally back to the car park.

As adults these have curious 'fangs', but with this one being young these were missing.

We checked on it regularly and its coat gradually dried out and it was breathing shallowly. It was obviously suffering from cold and exhaustion, so my husband fixed up a radiator while we kept the summer house doors closed. We also provided it with a dog bowl of water.

In time there were definite signs of improvement, even alertness, which was very encouraging. Come nightfall we switched off the radiator and left the door slightly ajar so that it could escape. Later in the evening we found the door was wide open and the deer vanished - success! Hopefully it will have learned to avoid the canal in future, in spite of its name!

We quite often see deer near our house - usually muntjac, but also water deer and even roe deer occasionally.









### Obituary: Phil Evans

### Thames Valley Police

With the darker nights drawing in, we typically see an increase in burglaries at this time of year. With this in mind, we would like to offer you some security advice.



- If you are leaving your home during the hours of darkness, leave a light on. We recommend using a light timer switch, along with a low energy bulb in a lamp, which can be set to come on and go off at a time which suits you. This makes it appear that someone is home. Burglars are usually opportunists and patrol areas. So don't let your home be their target.
- If you are going away, ask a neighbour to use your driveway if it is going to be vacant. This makes it appear that someone is coming and going.
- If you buy high value items, or you receive any for Christmas, don't leave the empty boxes outside your home as this advertises what you have inside your property.
- Make sure you key lock your door, not just pull it shut.
- If you have an alarm, ensure it is set when you are not in your property.
- Consider installing CCTV.
- We recommend installing sensor security lights which come on when someone walks onto your property.
- If you have a keyless vehicle, ensure the key is kept in a signal blocking box or pouch.
- Be vigilant. If you note a suspicious person or vehicle, report it. It may seem like a small piece of information, however it may be the missing piece of our jigsaw.

You may remember the photos of the bar headed geese at the reservoir in the October issue of *Marsworth News*.


On a visit to Whipsnade Zoo recently there was quite a colony of them on the lake by the restaurant. I told a volunteer at the Zoo about our sighting at the reservoir and this was the response from the bird team:

"The bar headed geese at Whipsnade are fully and permanently flight-restrained so definitely not the ones at the reservoir. Over the last few years there have been sightings of the



species in Bedfordshire/Hertfordshire with one seen in Leighton Buzzard a couple of years ago. It seems we might be building up a little feral population. There are many private waterfowl collections around and about so they are undoubtedly escapees from somewhere. The species is of 'Least Concern' globally so doing well in the wild both in their natural range and in the UK, so it would seem!"

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


