In the church calendar we have reached a period where most of the great occasions such as Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, Pentecost and Christ's Ascension have come and gone, except for Trinity Sunday. This special day celebrates the three members of the Trinity, God the Father, Jesus Christ his Son and the Holy Spirit. This is a conception that is hard to understand, and I find it easier to think of each one as real but not in human form, rather in spiritual form.

As I write this I recall that a few Sundays ago, I had the need to visit the Tesco store quite early in the morning we had just returned from holiday and found that we were short of a few essentials to get us through the day, I was surprised to find so many customers in the store, who, along with me, had found it necessary to shop on a Sunday. I was there to buy tea, coffee and milk, but most of the other shoppers had trolleys filled to capacity. I left the store puzzling as to why Sundays have become so unimportant, no different to any other weekday and no longer a day of rest or relaxation and the one day in the week which could be special or different.

The argument would no doubt be that there are many in our society who are not lucky enough not to have to undertake a huge weekly shop early on a Sunday morning, but my answer would be - is it really absolutely necessary to spend Sunday morning in a local store being jostled at check out, returning home to stack away purchases, possibly ending up irritable instead of finding some way of switching off from the daily routine that life in general has to offer? I am sure Tesco in Tring is no different to many, many supermarkets, large and small, across the country, but I am aware that whilst the stores are very busy, the churches are not.

This poses the question of does the Church fail to offer what the community needs? If this is the case in our village, and the answer is a firm 'yes', then how as a community should we deal with the matter?

Parish Council meeting May 2023 - highlights

Prior to the meeting Bob Kennedy was elected unopposed to the role of Chairman for the coming year.

Updates by Councillor Derek Town:

- The White Lion and SAC (Special Area of Conservation within 12.7 kms around the Chiltern Beechwoods). Cllr Town reported that there could be a delay in approving the planning application as Buckinghamshire Council were challenging a decision by the Planning Inspectorate which would adversely affect planning applications within the SAC.
- Ivinghoe Freight Strategy Signage was due to be placed outside of the freight zone within Hertfordshire and Bedfordshire.
- Community Garden Cllr Town was in discussion with the Asset Management Team in relation to permission to use of the land on the corner of Lukes Lea and Vicarage Road.
- Lower Icknield Way outside the Anglers Retreat –
 Cllr Town had listed the failed road with
 Buckinghamshire Highways as a capital allocation
 project as it is considered an important and busy route.
- Free Dementia Training is available at Wing Sports and Social Club on Wednesday 7th June. Two sessions a day, with 16 delegates per session. To book, email: wingandivinghoecb@buckinghamshire.gov.uk.

Jubilee Garden at the Rec

Re-wilding of grass verge on Vicarage Road Volunteers have rotavated the soil, the Parish Council has funded the seeds and it is hoped that children from Marsworth school will sow the seeds.

Community Speedwatch

Permission has been given by Buckinghamshire Council for signage to be placed at Lower Icknield Way and Lower End and signage has therefore been ordered.

Steam Rally parking

Details were given of the car park access and routes for vehicles to alleviate congestion. Traffic from Pitstone direction will be directed into Watery Lane to park in the Rec until the Rec is full, then main car park will be used. Traffic from Wilstone will go directly to main car park.

Contingency available for anyone who needed to leave whilst traffic still entering. One way out only.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Monday 12th June. Any items for the agenda should be submitted to the Parish Clerk by Friday 9th June.

Councillor Vacancy


Are you interested in your local community? Would you like to put something back into your local community?

Bill Layton - 1924 - 2023

Bill passed away on 22nd April, aged 98.

Bill was born in London and had a somewhat chequered childhood, leaving school as soon as he was able. He began working on the railways – in those days it was all steam – and



gradually moved up the ladder. He transferred to Watford and met and married Violet. They had two children, Pamela and Brian, and moved to Marsworth in the 1960's. The bungalow in Vicarage Road had previously been owned by an elderly couple who did not do much to either house or garden, so when they moved in Bill set to and began to sort out both house and garden.

Over time both of his children married. My younger brother Mervyn married Pamela. She died of liver cancer when they had been married for 25 years. Their boys, David and Daniel, were aged 12 and ten when their mum died. Brian in the meantime married Pauline and they went on to have three children – Anna, Gary and Emma.

Bill carried on with his work both on the house and garden as well as building model trains and clocks, amongst many things. He took early retirement when he thought that Violet needed him. Vi had diabetes and mental health problems which led to her being up one minute and down the next. The result of this was out of hand diabetes plus a mental problem. Bill knew that he had to do something, so when he was offered redundancy he jumped at the chance. He very quickly had Vi on a strict timetable of meals and checks which put her back onto the straight and narrow. This was not without its problems however, and he often had to argue with the doctors to get his own way!

He had a beautiful garden and over the years had planted it each year with bedding plants grown in one of his two greenhouses. In the other he grew tomatoes and cucumbers. He opened his garden to paying visitors at Flower Festivals, raising money for All Saints. He was a skilled engineer and as such was able to build a miniature railway around his garden which was enjoyed by many visitors. Inside the house he also installed a central heating system, knocked down a wall to make one large room, installed built-in wardrobes and many, many more things. Bill's tools were legendary! If anybody needed anything they would visit Bill to see if he had what they needed.

He was known to many people in Marsworth as he helped so many individuals and organisations on a regular basis. The Church was a main recipient of his help. He and Bill Faithful (who only had one leg) would regularly meet and mow the churchyard grass. They became firm friends and Bill was devastated when Bill Faithful died tragically whilst canoeing with a friend. To make up for Bill's death he would take his widow Delphine shopping every week.

Bill also mended the church clock which had not worked for many years. He did this with the help of Dr Cree who lived in the Mill House at the time, but it was Bill who had himself lowered to the clock to paint the dial. There is a famous photo of Bill sitting on a plank of wood suspended from the top of the tower, painting the dial which appeared in the local newspaper – not up to today's health and safety standards! When I asked him if he had a harness on he just looked at me and said "well no, but I did have a rope around my waist"! John White remembers asking him about a problem with the church clock years later and Bill told him to lie out of the window on his back and using a long stick just tip the hands around - and he was absolutely right!

When Violet died he became even more adventurous. His first foray into foreign travel, aged 80, was to Canada. He also enjoyed cruises and other holidays. One of them

was to Poland where he was able to drive a steam train. A photo of him was used on his order of service at his funeral, and the joy on his face at being able to drive a steam train again was absolutely amazing — that photo is here.



Some years after Pam died, Bill was one of the first people that Merv told that he had met and hoped to marry Lorraine. Merv and Lorraine visited him regularly, as did grandsons David and Daniel. Bill and David had an excellent relationship and they enjoyed each other's company. They would chat away whilst gardening or making/repairing something and over time became the best of friends as well as grandad and grandson. David learnt how to use the many tools that Bill had over the years and he knew exactly where things were in either of the sheds!

Bill was a complex character, seen by many as a jovial, helpful man but also by many as a man who could be a bit awkward. However, most of the village knew who they should go to for DIY advice and to maybe borrow tools. He was not a regular churchgoer, but he always put his name down to act as a steward at Flower Festivals. He was constantly cheerful, but in his latter years became grumpy and when dementia took hold he was no longer the Bill we all knew and loved.

We will miss you Bill - rest in peace.

Bucks Councillor's May report – extracts



New tool against potholes

As part of its new contract, which started on 1st April, Buckinghamshire Highways has taken delivery of a different type of vehicle to help with potholes.

Used by many councils across the country, the 'Pothole Pro' is a time-saving, three-in-one vehicle designed to make pothole repairs faster. First it cuts into the road surface where a pothole has appeared, it crops the



perimeter of the hole neatly to allow a watertight repair, and then it brushes away and collects the debris afterwards. Highways teams just need to lay and compact asphalt into the prepared hole to complete the repair.

Bucks families get primary school preferences

Figures published on 17th April show that overall, 98% of children in both Reception and Junior schools were offered one of their preference schools this year.

90% of children starting Reception received their top choice allocation, with 96% of families getting their first choice of Junior school. All children who expressed preferences in the Reception and Junior allocation rounds have been offered a school place in Buckinghamshire.

Childcare support for two-year-olds

Buckinghamshire Council is reminding parents of two-year-old children to check whether they are entitled to up to 15 hours a week funded childcare.

Any parent or carer who currently claims some benefits may qualify for this support, which is worth over £3,000. Full details of who is eligible can be found on the Buckinghamshire Council website.

The funded childcare can be used with participating childminders, day nurseries, pre-schools and nursery schools across Buckinghamshire.

Development and transport in Buckinghamshire

Buckinghamshire Council seeks views on its draft vision and objectives to guide future development and transport in Buckinghamshire.

The council is creating two long-term plans for what Buckinghamshire should be like in 2040 and how this can be achieved:

- The Local Plan for Buckinghamshire to shape and manage future development across Buckinghamshire.
- Local Transport Plan 5 (LTP 5) to set out the priorities for all types of transport across Buckinghamshire.

Bucks Tree Mission

Buckinghamshire Council is celebrating the significant progress made in its Bucks Tree Mission, with over 145,000 trees planted since October 2022. Alongside

the larger projects on council-owned land, community involvement has resulted in locally delivered, smaller tree planting projects across Bucks.

2,700 trees have been planted alongside St Peter's Greenway, a 1.7km shared-use path running between the Berryfields and Buckingham Park developments in northwest Aylesbury. Additionally, two 'tiny forests' have been established at Princes Risborough School and at Bourton Park in Buckingham, each consisting of 600 trees. Additionally, over 109,000 trees have already been planted by Forestry England at the new Wing Woods.

New trial for free bus pass holders

Older and disabled residents in Buckinghamshire who qualify for a free bus pass can now benefit following the introduction of a new 'early bird' trial which allows them to use the bus before 9am for a reduced fare.

Holders of an older person's bus pass or a disabled bus pass in Buckinghamshire are allowed free travel on buses. Previously this was only after 9am on Monday to Friday. In a pilot arrangement with local bus companies, Buckinghamshire Council has arranged for new, extended benefits to free bus pass holders to travel on a bus before 9am on weekdays by paying a fixed £1 fare. These additional benefits will be in place until 31st August 2023.

PayPal Scams

PayPal is an online payment system, and although generally safe due to its end-to-end encryption and two-factor authentication, scammers use tactics like hoax emails or links which take you to a fake PayPal site that asks for your personal and credit card details.

PayPal only sends out emails for payment notifications, receipts and promotional purposes. These come from its primary email address paypal@mail.paypal.com. But you may also come across service@paypal.com or paypal.me. A genuine PayPal email will always address you by name and will not use an impersonal greeting like 'Dear User'.

Common PayPal scams

These trick you into thinking an order or payment is real; be especially suspicious of overpayment notifications, shipping address issues, advance payment problems and warnings that your account has been hacked or scammed.

If you think you have been scammed secure your account immediately by changing your password and report it to PayPal's Resolution Centre which may be able to refund any lost monies and inform the Police.

How to avoid being scammed

Always verify the authenticity of an email or transaction if you are giving personal or financial information. Before you send goods to a purchaser ensure the purchaser is genuine. Additionally look for errors in the email address and be sceptical; remember 'if it's too good to be true it probably is'. Don't click on links appearing to be from PayPal, log into to your account instead. Don't use delivery services you are unfamiliar with and never share information such as passwords and other login data. If you are a regular online seller using PayPal you can sign up to its Seller Protection Programme for additional security.

Pat Carty and the Airfield

There was a considerable turnout at Long Marston Village Hall to see and hear Pat Carty give another of his talks on the Marsworth/Cheddington Airfield. Pat, author of the book "Secret Squadrons of the Eighth", is an expert on the subject.

A natural speaker, he kept the audience enthralled with a mixture of information and entertaining anecdotes. He comprehensively covered the history of the airfield, from when the farmland was taken over by the Ministry of Defence in 1940, through its original occupation by the RAF to its more significant usage by the American Air Force. He covered the stories of a number of the squadrons involved and some of the colourful characters who had been part of them.

Particular focus was given to the usage of the airfield and its squadrons for the dropping of leaflets over countries of mainland Europe occupied by Nazi forces.

He also told of the visits by James Cagney and General Patton, and of a number of the crashes which occurred locally.

Of special interest were his recollections of the involvement of Marsworth farmers Arthur Reeve and Harvey Hodgkiss. It was Arthur's land at Church Farm, Marsworth which was to be covered by runways and huts. The story of Harvey involved the attempts to destroy the impenetrable underground bunkers on the airfield site which were originally created as extra security in wartime conditions, but later had a more sinister (and mysterious) usage by the CIA (see *Marsworth News*, September 2019).

Pat described the creation of the memorial at Airfield entrance on Long Marston Road and the ceremony which was held there in 1982, when a number of American airmen who had served at the Airfield were present.





Rural Rambler By Steve

A series of walks around Marsworth and the local countryside. All the walks in this series can now be downloaded from the Marsworth website where a higher resolution map is available: https://www.marsworth.org.uk/the-marsworth-news/rural-rambler/.

No. 8 Ashridge and Ivinghoe Beacon

We visit some classic localities in this month's walk, the Bridgewater Monument on the Ashridge Estate and the local landmark of Ivinghoe Beacon.

The total walk is about 6.5 miles and takes around 2.5 hours. The Ashridge section is easy going but the ascent of the Beacon and the section immediately afterwards is steep. There is one alternative route which includes an additional hill. No stiles but a few gates.

The walk starts at the Bridgewater Monument (HP4 1LX), access to which is off the B4506 Berkhamsted to Dagnall road. Plenty of parking is available.

Standing at the base of the monument with your back to the café, take the track marked 'Duncombe Terrace Mobility Track' straight ahead (the right hand of the two clear paths). This track is suitable for wheelchairs and mobility scooters and is straightforward to follow; after

approx. 1.3 miles there is a sign marking the end of the maintained mobility section, carry straight on. After another couple of hundred yards, you will pass kennels on your right (always barking dogs!) and then at 1.9 miles pass straight on at a cattle grid.

Continue ahead until

you reach a small car park beside the Beacon Road, marked out with large logs (Point A). Turn diagonally left, between the logs in the corner of the car park, and head on a less well-defined path towards the large group of beech trees on the Beacon Road. Cross the road by the trees and take the trackway ahead, which leads downhill through sheep pasture (dogs on leads please!). After passing through a gate the path becomes slightly less clear but carry on downhill, bearing left and heading for a kissing gate in the left hand corner at the bottom of the field (B).

Passing through the gate, take the track between the fields with the Ivinghoe Beacon ridge on your left. In spring and summer these fields are home to skylarks that can be heard singing as they fly up to great heights.

This valley is also a regular haunt of many migratory birds of passage in spring and autumn. Continue along this track until reaching the first trees (C) then turn left up the steep hill with a partial hedge on your right. At the gate in the hedge turn left onto the ridge and follow this, through a gate, to the top of Ivinghoe Beacon (D). Take a few moments to admire the view - on a clear day you can see as far as the Snowdome in Milton Keynes.

Leave the top of the hill via the obvious paths (marked as part of the Ridgeway Trail) down to the Beacon Road, avoiding options that go off to the left. At the road cross over and follow the Ridgeway signs up the steps. A hundred yards or so from the top of the steps a grassy bridleway goes off on the left (F); take this for the main route. Go straight ahead on the Ridgeway for an alternative route (see below). If on the main route follow the grassy bridleway, bearing right where signposted. This brings you out onto an area of rough grass beside the Beacon Road. Walk along a path through the grass until the small car park with logs is reached. At the car park turn right onto the track and retrace your steps back to the Monument.


For the alternative route go straight ahead at Point F and follow the Ridgeway through the trees until a gate is reached, after which the path descends rapidly along the edge of an impressive

steep-sided valley called Incombe Hole.

Towards the base of the slope fences mark the right angle corner of a field (G). Turn left (straight ahead takes The Ridgeway to Pitstone Hill car park), walk beside the fence then bear left uphill. Enter the woods via a gate, pass the yellow-capped way-marker post and continue diagonally uphill until the Mobility Track is met (H). Turn right and retrace steps back to the Monument.



The Tring Anglers

Last month I celebrated the change to a settled weather pattern, however strange weather continues to play games with water levels. The local Canal & River Trust team are still having to cope with an excess of water in the system. This creates problems which can be dealt with in the Winter when boat movement is minimal, but in Spring and Summer it's more of a problem for boaters when water is cascading over the lock gates.

Does the condition of the Canal make a difference to angling? One symptom I have observed is the strange crust which floats from the bottom to form an impenetrable layer of silt on the surface. The worst of these unsightly outbreaks is normally on the Aylesbury Arm, but this year it was much worse than usual. It certainly messed up one of my fishing sessions on the main canal at lock 39-40 by the picnic table. It was mostly clear when I arrived but as evening approached it became impossible to fish. The fish refused to feed as always happens in this situation and, in the end, it was so thick it was impossible to fish. As I write it seems to have disappeared for another year. I asked a boater if it caused him any problems and he said it was no problem and did not stick on the propeller.

Thinking of boaters, over the years I have often been offered a cuppa by a moored kind boater while fishing. I am pleased to say that this happened on two consecutive recent outings. Once at Apsley and then at Marsworth, a big thanks to both of them as although I have my flask it always seems to run out! It reminded me of when I first started fishing in 1960 with my uncle Jack, and the canal still had a number of commercial boats, one always shared a beverage with us. Sadly I cannot remember the name of the family or the boat but it always stopped for a few minutes at the top of Marsworth Flight for a short tea break.

As I would expect it always seems that the bream provide most sport at this time of year both prior to, and just after,



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
