Marsworth Polish Hostel Nissen hut at risk of demolition

An application has been submitted for the demolition of buildings at Bluebells, Lower End, Marsworth for 'the construction of a single storey dwelling with associated garage'.

This application involves the demolition and removal of the last remaining feature of the Marsworth Polish Hostel, which has often been referred to in *Marsworth News*. The Hostel was home to several hundred Polish people who had been displaced by World War II and found temporary refuge here in Marsworth between 1948 and 1961 in what had been the old buildings associated with the USAF on Long Marston Road, at the end of Church Farm Lane and at Bluebells.

An information board was erected in 2019 near the site of the main part of the hostel and many Polish people who had been children at the hostel attended a colourful and memorable unveiling ceremony. A website was also created.

Since the closure of the hostel in 1961 all the huts used for accommodation and services were demolished and returned to agriculture – with one exception. That is the Nissen hut still visible from Long Marston Road, painted white, which had been used by the subsequent owner for garden purposes. This hut was the home to two Polish families.

Apart from the graves in All Saints churchyard, this hut is the one remaining feature of the Polish Hostel, other than the brick building alongside which was used as a washroom.

You have until 13th September to register your objection.

Note that planning permission has just been granted for the construction of an additional storey to create first floor living accommodation at an existing detached house at Bluebells.

Marsworth Airfield – greenfield v brownfield

There has been a lot of discussion by residents and MPC agreed that the Airfield should not be considered brownfield. MPC will write to the Senior Planning Officer accordingly. Stephen Wooler has kindly assisted MPC in drafting a letter to this effect and also thanks go to Sandra Costello and Jonny Taylor (who now holds the Marsworth Archives) for providing some of the supporting historical documentation.

Planning breach at Startops Haze

Following complaints from residents regarding an overbearing wooden fence that has been erected around the property, the Buckinghamshire Councillors have reported a planning breach.

Local Heritage List

If residents are aware of buildings that should be on the Buckinghamshire Local Heritage List then they should let the clerk know. All Saints Church and the Nissen hut at Bluebells, Lower End have both been listed with the assistance of Richard Cooper and Sandra Costello respectively.

Graffiti at Marsworth bus shelter

This was kindly cleaned by volunteer Ron Busby, but graffiti subsequently appeared again and was cleaned by Denise Cornwall. Please be on the lookout for our bus shelter being vandalised in this way.

Community Speedwatch in Marsworth

Ron Busby has now met with Thames Valley Police and site locations have been agreed. Some overgrown hedges along Lower Icknield Way needed to be cut back before the scheme can start.

Footpath Pitstone to Marsworth

Bucks Household Recycling Centres get top marks

Overall satisfaction with all ten of the county's Household Recycling Centres (HRCs) is 100% according to the latest figures from the bi-annual Customer Satisfaction Survey.



100% of those interviewed said they were satisfied overall with the HRCs.

The layout of containers on site and the helpfulness of site staff also received 100% satisfaction ratings.

Gareth Williams, Buckinghamshire Council's Cabinet Member for Climate Change and Environment said: "Our wish is to make it as easy as possible for people to be able to get rid of their household waste and recycling in a responsible and convenient way."

The survey also asked site users about the reuse facilities at the HRC sites, gauging awareness of the reuse shops at Aston Clinton and High Wycombe HRCs and their knowledge of donating items for resale and reuse.

In 2022-23, reuse tonnage was 941 tonnes in total. Staff working at all HRCs also keep an eye out for items brought to the sites to see whether they can be resold and direct residents to the reuse area. Items are taken from all 10 sites and delivered to the two shops in Aston Clinton and High Wycombe. Top selling items include furniture, garden ornaments, crockery and sporting equipment – all of which can be donated directly to one of the reuse shops which are run by South Bucks Hospice.

The reuse shops are open for the same hours as the HRCs and are staffed by South Bucks Hospice staff. More donations are always welcome.



Bin collection information changes



Buckinghamshire Council has now changed the way it supplies information regarding

forthcoming bin collection dates. No longer is a useful calendar supplied, which has been the way in which *Marsworth News* has been able to provide information for the coming month. Now it seems that the only way to get the information is by going online, entering your postcode and then identifying your actual address. This is presumably to check whether or not you have paid for Garden Waste collection. This then supplies the date for the next collection.

This information only covers the next two collections and is updated following each collection date. It seems it will no longer be possible to view a month's dates in advance.



Bulbourne Yard on the Grand Union Canal near Tring used to be an important historic site on the canal network, comprising a unique collection of canalside workshops, offices and dwellings.

The site was historically used for the construction of lock gates and other waterway infrastructure. However the layout, configuration and access to the buildings were designed predominantly for manual working with small workshops and low ceiling heights.

The decision was made in 2003 to relocate production and the site was eventually sold for development into residential properties.

Great efforts were made to ensure that the historic nature and architectural integrity of the site were retained. 25 homes have been created in what is now a very attractive location.

The yard at Bulbourne has been used as film locations for *Midsommer Murders* and *Call the Midwife*.

The CRT will no longer have a presence there other than access to the Wharfage for loading boats.

Adopters for children from Black African and Caribbean communities needed

Buckinghamshire Council is calling for people who may be considering adoption to get in touch. Adopters are needed for all children in Bucks, but those who are looking to adopt a child or young person from Black African and Black Caribbean heritage are particularly sought after.

Day Travelcards to stay

Buckinghamshire Council has written to the Mayor of London insisting he immediately withdraws the proposal by Transport for London to cease sale of Day Travelcards for people travelling into and throughout London. This follows a motion debated and overwhelmingly agreed across all political parties at its recent full Council meeting.

In his letter to Sadiq Khan, Councillor Martin Tett, Leader of Buckinghamshire Council, states:



"Currently, Day Travelcards provide unlimited travel on TfL services, including London Underground, bus, tram, Docklands Light Railway, London Overground and the Elizabeth line, and National Rail services in London. They can also be used to obtain a one third reduction in River Services fares. The proposals to remove Day Travelcards constitute an unfair, unacceptable, and expensive levy on Buckinghamshire residents who wish to travel to London. The proposals have deliberately targeted the removal of the Day Travelcard as a method to generate additional income for TfL."




The great internet outage

Congratulations to all who survived the great Tring and surrounding villages internet outage!

Nesting rodents had gnawed through ducting, casing and multiple cables which would usually need a drill to get through, explained Openreach.

But was the glis glis, the 'edible dormouse' introduced to Tring Park in 1902 by Walter Rothschild, behind it all? The jury is out. Images of one of the culprits certainly looked like a glis glis, and one Facebook user claimed workmen had mentioned the so-called rats were 'protected', while another commented, 'It's the Tringest thing that ever Tring'd!'

On Twitter, Tring Radio complained:

'How can a whole town be brought to a standstill by rats in this day and age? No internet for three days! Lots of compensation has got to be coming Tring and the surrounding villages way - for the 5000+ homes and businesses affected! Totally outrageous in the modern age.'


Another Tring resident wrote: 'Everyone around us has no internet, whether it be Sky, BT or Virgin etc. Very frustrating! Not sure how it can take such a big company so long to fix.'



Chewed cable

Meanwhile, those who tried to use Buckinghamshin data connections to work from home struggled, with local masts overloaded. The outage lasted from Saturday

July 29 to Wednesday August 2, with Marsworth coming back online on Tuesday evening.



More than 5,000 homes and businesses in an area spanning Aldbury Common, Berkhamsted, Marsworth, Long Marston, Cheddington and Cholesbury were all said to have been affected. They all use the same exchange in the Tring area.

Engineers used ducts to get to the damaged cables and repair them, then sealed them in to stop another rat attack, reports LBC. Repairs were hampered because a private property was on top of one of the underground chambers the cables run in.

But there is a positive - the internet seems a bit faster in Marsworth. Hopefully Openreach did some upgrading work alongside the cabling repairs.

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Report in Metro UK:

"A small UK town has been left without internet for days and it could be down to a tiny creature linked to the Rothschild family.

Homeowners in Tring, Hertfordshire, were devastated after a nesting edible dormouse (known as the glis glis) bit through Openreach wires just outside.

Experts have said the whiskered wrecker, which was introduced by the family in 1902, is known to cause havoc. But their latest escapades led to around 10,000 homes losing internet connection for three days."

Rural Rambler By Steve

No. 10 Studham: Queen Elizabeth Platinum Jubilee Walk. 3.8 (alternative extension of 5.5) miles

This lovely walk is within the Chilterns AONB and based in the village of Studham in Central Bedfordshire. It starts and ends within the village and traverses the surrounding countryside and local landmarks. The walk is generally well signposted, includes open fields and woodland and is easy going with kissing gates and one stile; some sections are muddy in wet weather. The walk outlined below is 3.8 miles (6 km) with the option for a 2.2 mile (3.6 km) extension. Two pubs, The Red Lion and The Bell, in Studham provide useful watering holes.

Studham is about 10 miles from Marsworth. Take the B489 from lvinghoe towards Dunstable, turning right at the roundabout by the dental surgery then left up the hill (B4540) to Whipsnade Zoo. After passing the Zoo turn right at the next roundabout and follow the road through Holywell to Studham. Park opposite the war memorial on the common.

The walk commemorates Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee and the following description is based on the walk leaflet created by the Friends of Studham Common (*www.foscomm.org*) which can be freely downloaded from the Chiltern Society *https://chilternsociety.org.uk/free-walks-leaflets/.*

The Walk

From the War Memorial opposite the Red Lion pub, follow the footpath along the common, keeping to the right of the goalposts, into woodland and continuing straight on until you come to the village school and School Cottage. Pass to the left of the school, with open fields to your left and continue on the same footpath until reaching Valley Road (point A). Cross the road and, after 250 yards, pass through a kissing gate, immediately after

which turn right over a stile (B) and onto a section of the Chiltern Way. A short walk across a field will lead you alongside and then into woods. Just into the woods turn right then after a few yards join a track up to the 13th century St Mary's Church.

Enter the church gate and look around this very well kept churchyard, leaving via the kissing gate in the left hand (NW) corner of the churchyard (C) and turn right to join a footpath along the side of fields. After the second field, approx. 300 yards, turn left beside the hedge (Point D, signposted) and follow the footpath downhill to Dunstable Road.


Carefully cross the road onto the pavement opposite and turn left

towards Holywell. After 100 yards take the footpath on the right (point E, an easy to miss narrow entrance beside 'Longyards' farm) uphill and into more woods. Follow the footpath into open countryside and then into further woodland alongside the Holywell housing estate.

Turn right (F) and follow the footpath through a small wood and then across a large arable field and a small copse. After crossing the field, the footpath goes alongside further woodland and then passes between a small collection of houses and a Scout Activity Centre, before ending on the Byslips Road (G). Take great care, the road is winding and has no footpath. Turn left along Byslips Road and after 130 yards turn right on the footpath into Byslips Wood (H). As you walk through the wood note the many mature oak trees on your right, seemingly planted to mark an old boundary and many showing signs of coppicing in their youth. Turn right at the end of the wood finally coming out onto a well-worn track (point I, marked '16' on the waymark post).

To take the alternative route of an extra 2.2 miles (1.7 miles on the Chiltern Society. leaflet but I measured it somewhat longer) turn left on the track, which becomes a footpath between hedges. Follow for 0.8 mile until reaching a road and Hollybush Lodge. Take the right turn signposted to Beechwood Farm B&B. After approx. 0.5 mile turn right at Beechwood Home Farm and walk past farm buildings and cottages, through a dilapidated kissing gate and onto a good track through the woods. This track ends at a junction with a flurry of 'No Footpath' signs; the route is straight ahead on a narrow path into the woods and marked with a yellow capped way-marker. Eventually coming out of the woods turn right and after a few yards join the main route at point M on Studham Common.

If staying on the main route, turn right on the track from point I, gently downhill until a water treatment works is reached. Just past the works a gap in the hedge on your left takes you on to Studham East Common. Continue up the hill on the edge of the common to point M and then follow the path west along the top of the common until you reach a small car park on Byslips Road (N). Take care crossing the road to enter Middle Common. At this point, follow the path diagonally across the Common, through the Jubilee Copse, planted to celebrate Queen Elizabeth's Silver Jubilee, and returning to the start of the walk.

Surgery changes

Patients registered at Aston Clinton Surgery, but living outside the new Westongrove Partnership catchment area (which only extends as far as Wilstone in our direction), have been asked to find another GP surgery within 28 days. The reason given is the number of new builds in the area.

A letter to affected patients says: "For many years we were happy to continue to keep patients registered with us when they lived outside the new Westongrove Partnership boundary. However, with the increasing pressure on GP list sizes and the growth within the practice catchment area, it is unfortunately no longer possible for us to do so.'

Those who do not change GP surgery will be automatically removed from the list after 28 days, so everyone is urged to register with their nearest practice as soon as possible."

Many affected and posting on Facebook, say they have been with Aston Clinton Surgery for up to 40 years and are very sad. 'It will be a bit of a mental and emotional adjustment' says one.

Another says: 'Yes - ceremoniously dumped after 26 years ... even people with Bucks postcodes have been dumped in Marsworth. Blamed all the new builds when I called. We are only 2.1 miles away but there is no right to remain.'

The majority are moving to Rothschild House Group, where former Aston Clinton partner Dr Craig White is now a doctor at Markyate.

It is easy enough to register online with Rothschild House Surgery in Tring, but access to records on the NHS app can be lost, at least temporarily.

Burglaries happen all year but peaks are seen around Christmas, when there are more dark hours, and also in the Summer. Doors and windows being left open in warmer weather offer burglars potential easy access and are an invitation for opportunists. Our village PCSO Megan contacted Marsworth NHW to report there has been an increase in the number of burglaries recently. She provided advice on keeping your home safe and you can find this on this page, if your NHW co-ordinator has not already provided you with it.

Always lock and secure your doors and windows, don't

make access to your garden straightforward – wheelie bins are great at helping get over fences and secure any sheds and garages.



There has again been an increase in our area of car and catalytic convertor theft. Never

leave your car unlocked, windows open or keys in the ignition, even on your own drive. Don't leave any valuables in your car and if it has wing mirrors that fold in, ensure they always are. Criminal gangs look to see if they aren't as a sign the car is not properly locked.

Thames Valley Police (TVP)

In the year from April 2022 to March 2023, TVP had nearly one million contacts from the public, attended 170,000 incidents, made 31,000 arrests and drove in excess than 13 million miles in the process!

In the air:

TVP drones were sent out to 1,004 incidents, up 66% on the previous year. There has recently been a documentary series on television following the work of the Police drone units, which hilighted how invaluable they are in searching areas from above. They are especially effective when using heat seeking equipment that pinpoints suspected criminals hiding. Previously they would have escaped arrest.

With four legs:

Police dogs were sent out to 6,990 incidents, up 11% on the previous year. Police horses went to 505 incidents, 33 of those times to support other police forces.

A year like no other

This period also saw TVP undertake one of the largest policing operations in their history with the committal service of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in Windsor.

They also policed Reading Festival, Royal Ascot, Henley Regatta, and have policed four of the UEFA Women's EURO 2022 matches at Stadium MK.

This summer Thames Valley Police (TVP) will open its doors to the public for the Force Open Day.

The event will take place between 10am and 4pm on Saturday 2nd September and will be hosted at the TVP training centre in Sulhamstead, near Reading.

The Open Day provides a fantastic opportunity to get a behind the scenes look at what it takes to police one of the biggest non-metropolitan policing areas in the country.

The Roads Policing Unit, Forensic Investigations Unit, Contact Management team and Major Crime Unit are some of over 40 exhibitors who will be there to showcase their work.

Burglary Advice



There has been a recent spate of burglaries across the area, and we wanted to take this opportunity to offer residents some security advice.

- Ensure all windows and doors are secure and keys are taken out of the locks.
- Mark all valuable items with your post code using a UV pen or permanent marker. This makes it easier for us to return items to you should we recover them. It also makes them less desirable to thieves.
- Take photographs of valuable items such as jewellery. This will help us to identify them if they are taken.
- Consider installing a safe and have this secured to the floor or wall.
- Make a note of any serial numbers on electrical items or power tools.
- If you have a house alarm, ensure it is set when you leave your home and/or your property. This may act as a deterrent and could also help us to identify the offenders.
- Install PIR lights outside your home. This will alert you and/or your neighbours if someone was on your property during the hours of darkness.

Please report anything suspicious to the Police by calling 999. Even if you feel it is a small piece of information, this may be the missing piece that we are looking for. If it is not an incident in progress, you can report any information by calling 101 or via our online reporting system on the Thames Valley Police website.



Muntjac deer

This article (here somewhat shortened) appeared in the Sunday Times of 26 March 2023. It was forwarded to us by Paula Abramson. Muntjac are quite common in the more rural Marsworth area.

The muntjac is a small non-native invasive species of deer no bigger than a medium-sized dog, which appears in gardens throughout southeast England and parts of Wales.

There are more deer in the UK than at any time since the Norman conquest, and in many places their population is far too large, according to the Countryside Alliance. Muntjac are a particular problem because they are small enough to get through garden fences and are less afraid of humans than larger deer species.

Muntjac were introduced to England from southeast China in the early 19th century. A pair resided in London Zoo and some were later placed in Woburn Park in Bedfordshire by the 11th Duke of Bedford, who was notorious for introducing invasive species to the UK. After releases and escapes, they became established in the wild in about the 1930s.

There are no up-to-date figures for their population. A 2009 parliamentary report put it at more than 150,000, mainly in England, but according to the British Deer Society the real number is likely to be a lot higher. They have not gained a foothold in Scotland, where it is illegal to release muntjac or let them escape into the wild.

Alastair Ward, of Leeds University, describes muntjac as "the most problematic deer species in England and Wales". They breed quickly and there is no proper strategy to contain them. They can destroy gardens and are also a cause of road accidents.

Last year the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs launched a consultation on deer management in the UK, which included muntjac. Proposals for population control include encouraging hunting for meat (their venison is considered very good). In a garden they tend to gorge on the tips of flowering plants. They also like to scrape the sap from the bark of small trees. The Royal Horticultural Society recommends planting nearer your house, where the muntjac are less likely to tread, and to



consider plants that they tend to avoid, such as lilac, honeysuckle and bay.

Under the Alien Species (Enforcement and Permitting) Order 2019, muntjac are classified as an invasive species, so their capture and rerelease is not permitted. You can, however, shoot them, provided you have the permission of the landowner and a gun licence. Muntjac are already culled under the provisions of the Deer Act 1991 and, unlike most other deer species, such as red, fallow and roe, may be hunted legally all year round.

With an excess of supply and lack of demand, the price of venison has dropped. A pilot project run by the Country Food Trust will serve venison ragout in food banks across the country. Muntjac meat is said by connoisseurs to be delicious. It is high in protein and has lower levels of saturated fat than beef and other red meat.

London restaurants are apparently now serving muntjac.

A further description from The Wildlife Trust

A very small, stocky deer, the muntjac deer is about the same size as a medium dog. It is gingerybrown, with a pale underside, darker stripes in its face, and small, single-pointed antlers.



Drinking tonight?



Will you be safe to drive tomorrow?

Research suggests that approximately 20% of people detected over the drink-drive limit are caught the morning after having a drink – between 6am and noon. This number has risen significantly in the last decade to approximately 5,500 people each year.

From April 2022 to March 2023 there were 385 drinkdriving arrests in Buckinghamshire Council's area. This is why the message from the council's road safety initiative Travel Safe Bucks is: If you've been drinking the night before, remember you could still have alcohol in your system the following day; so if you have to go to work, appointments or make the school run, then plan ahead and don't drive the morning after.

On average, it takes one hour for alcohol to be absorbed into the bloodstream fully, and then one hour per unit consumed for alcohol to leave the body. So, eight units of alcohol (approximately three large glasses of wine) takes around nine hours to leave the body.

There is no way to know how much a person can drink and stay under the limit, since it can depend on weight, age, metabolism, the amount of food they've eaten and other factors. It doesn't matter if you eat carb-based foods, drink two litres of water or have a cold shower, the alcohol still takes the same amount of time to leave the body.

The Tring Anglers

I always welcome September; the best month for angling in my experience. All wildlife begins to prepare for surviving

the winter while the food supply is at its peak and the weather is still clement. Fish are at their fittest and finest in the Autumn and their coloration is at its boldest.

I have mentioned before that sometimes fish seem to vanish from the waters and we cannot seem to catch them. This year the roach fishing in our local canals was almost non-existent; only the odd small fish showing in

our catches. All of a sudden August produced large numbers of good size roach up to 1.5lb in catches in many canal sections. These fish are from three to eight years old, so where have they been? Reports from the River Thames match angling groups showed that weights of roach followed a similar pattern. In June and July catches consisted of perch, small chub and some bream. In August, however, winning weights were mostly roach by quantity. This peculiar pattern is very noticeable this year, but it has always happened, to some degree, in all of my sixty years fishing.

At the moment the fish are spread out along the network – be it river or canal – as winter approaches, however, fish shoal up together and fishermen need to know where they might be found to stand any chance of a reasonable

catch. I remember having a chat with one of the skilled men who move and rescue fish under contract to the Canal & River Trust, among other organisations. He recounted how often in the winter they would electro-fish a section, prior to works being carried out, and for 300 yards hardly a fish was

It has now meant we can start a proper progress towards a junior club, rather than just being members of The Tring Anglers.

I am delighted to report that yet again our Junior angler Maja Davidson produced a successful match result. Fishing the Regional event on the Canal at Three Locks Stoke Hammond she had the top weight off all participants with 5lb 8oz. Congratulations Maja! We look forward to the National event in September.



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
