The 'diamond sign' is back!

This sign, which had been a feature of Marsworth for over 100 years and had something of a place in the hearts of local people, was stolen from its concrete post by the White Lion Bridge on 13th October 2023. It is now back in place, looking even better than before.


Paul Rance, who undertook to refurbish it during 2016, has been its 'minder' since it was recovered under somewhat mysterious circumstances on 25th October 2023. Paul still has no idea what happened to it during those twelve days, or who might have taken it. It had sustained a certain amount of damage while being removed, and Paul decided to refurbish it once again.

Paul reports that the wording on this unusual sign, which itemises weight limits on the bridge, amounted to over 400 characters, each of which was painstakingly repainted; luckily the white background had been powder-coated in 2016 and only needed a good clean.

Helping Paul with the task of replacing the sign, estimated to weigh some 50kg, was a stalwart band of five young men:

Tom Folley, Blake Moorcroft, Jack Rance, Luke Johnson and Sam Messenger.

The two vehicles involved were able to partly pull off the Icknield Way so that the traffic flow over the bridge was unaffected.

Precept

It was agreed by MPC that the precept be set at £23,000 (an increase of 5.54%) resulting in an uplift for Band D residents from £61.88 in 2023/24 to £64.57 for 2024/25, an increase of £3.52 per annum. New bench for courtyard at the Village Hall

The small remaining balance of the Section 106 funding from Marsworth Wharf will be used to purchase a bench for the courtyard at the Village Hall.

This will be relocated to allow an increased turning circle for vehicles at the end of Watery Lane by the Recreation Ground.

Canal & River Trust has set a legal process in place to remove the caravan.

Pitstone Quarry restoration

The Clerk and Cllr Steve Smith from MPC attended the drop-in session on 28th November. The first phase will be completed 18 months from planning consent. This development will form part of the SAC (Special Area of Conservation) mitigation strategy in relation to protecting Ashridge.

Transport to School Policy

The council was advised that Buckinghamshire Council is changing its Transport to School Policy. The consultation period on this ends 31st January. The MPC is to write to Bucks to ensure current options are maintained. Parents are advised to review the new policy, which is still in consultation stage: https://yourvoicebucks.citizenspace.com/integratedtransport/home-to-school-2024/.



All Saints Church



At this time of year, we look back to 2023 and forward to 2024. The year of 2023 was for my family a very, very sad, difficult year. Following a diagnosis of pancreatic cancer in March 2022 our daughter Sarah died at the age of 58 in March 2023. The grief experienced by everyone who knew her was hard to bear. Christmas proved to be a considerable challenge since Sarah always produced a truly memorable celebration. However, for Christmas 2023 we and Sarah's family decided that a change of venue might help and we all went to stay with our son and his family in North Wales.

This proved to be a welcome respite from our grief with the company of young folk and surrounded by lovely mountains and beaches which we enjoyed visiting - the younger ones even venturing into the sea on Boxing Day! For us personally a service in Bangor Cathedral for Carols and Midnight Mass, a very High Church occasion conducted in Welsh, English and Latin was a very special, wonderful experience. I make no apologies for the personal nature of this part of the church newsletter.

Returning to Christmas in Marsworth, earlier in December the church was floodlit once again and remained so into January. As usual the church was traditionally decorated for the Service of Nine Lessons and Carols conducted by James. Thanks must go to those who decorated the church and Christmas tree and assembled the stable, manger and figurines, and also for the dismantling of same on 6th January 2024.

I understand that all the services held over Christmas were well attended. The Crib Service was held by Rev. Roger Hale on the afternoon of Christmas Eve, and on Christmas Day Roger returned to All Saints to lead the Christmas morning Holy Communion Service. Thank you Roger for your much appreciated help. James conducted the Christmas Midnight Mass Service.

Moving on into the new year of 2024, the first event after the birth of Jesus at Christmas is the Feast of the

Epiphany on 6th January whereby the Infant Christ is introduced to the world as Saviour. These three travellers presented the baby with symbolic gifts and then departed. King Herod was perturbed by this new arrival of a baby who could possibly challenge his position, so he authorised the slaughter of every male child two years old or under within Bethlehem. Joseph and Mary, having been warned of this impending massacre, took their baby son Jesus to Egypt, only returning to Nazareth when it was safe to do so.

Within our own church, with James firmly established, we look forward to renewed and new growth and fellowship in the coming year. Hopefully this new year will see new faces within All Saints Church. Already we are seeing much more of the school children who are getting involved with services in the church, and we must thank James for his regular input in this field.

On the social front, the usual ramble took place on New Year's Day with 15 enjoying lunch afterwards in church. Thanks to Steve and Caroline Smith for organising the ramble. We have the Helpers' Party in The Red Lion on Friday 9th February as a way for the PCC to thank all those kind folk who give so much of their time to keeping All Saints Church and its environs looking shipshape throughout the year.

Wendover Canal News, Winter 2024



Wendover to Halton towpath upgrade June-November 2023

The upgrade of the 2.7km / 1.7 mile towpath from Wendover to Halton was completed at the end of November. Wendover Canal Trust first initiated this upgrade work in December 2020 at the suggestion of Wendover Parish Council. WCT then negotiated the funding for it over the next two years and worked with Canal & River Trust who managed the project last year.



The resulting all-weather, 1.5m-wide path along this green corridor has been universally praised by pedestrians, runners and cyclists. Large numbers of children are now using the path to get to and from the schools on the Wendover Campus at Wharf Road. Wheelchair users are delighted as this is the first time ever that they have been able to go down this beautiful stretch due to its previous muddy and uneven condition.

Likewise, there have been excellent reactions on social media – this post on our website over the New Year is typical: "Huge thanks to all at the Wendover Arm Trust for the restoration of the towpath between Wendover and

Halton. It makes a very pleasant walk an absolute breeze for people of all abilities. It is also very popular: we walked it Boxing Day and found that by midday it was full of people enjoying themselves. Well done!"



The upgraded towpath will be formally opened via a celebratory walk, with associated entertainment and refreshments, on Friday 28th June.

Three related projects will be completed by our volunteers prior to June: the fitting of new railings at Wharf Road, the building of a new brick wall for these on the pavement-facing side, and the fixing of new signage in CRT format along the towpath between Wendover and Halton. 90% of the funding for this project has come from the HS2 Chiltern AONB Review Group.

New Footpath at Bulbourne?

Would you use a footpath between Bulbourne Wharf and Westfield Road, Pitstone - giving circular walk options from Marsworth via Bulbourne to Castlemead and offering various return routes?

Pitstone Parish Council is looking at the feasibility of a new footpath from the roundabout at Folly Farm at the Westfield Rd/Upper Icknield Way junction towards Bulbourne. Marsworth Parish Council supports this proposal and encourages Marsworth residents to complete the online questionnaire (see link below).

Currently there is no footpath from the Bulbourne Wharf development, the end of the College Farm/College Lake bridlepath and the roundabout, preventing safe circular walks from Marsworth via Bulbourne and Castlemead/ Pitstone. This short section of footpath would open up a number of alternative circular walk options as well as providing pedestrian access from the Bulbourne direction to the planned restoration of Pitstone Quarry.

Buckinghamshire Council's Community Board has advised that such a path would not qualify for grant funding via the Board, so it would need to be funded locally or via grants from other sources, if such exist.

Before further investigative work can be undertaken Pitstone Parish Council need to assess how many people already walk this route, would utilise a new path, where you are trying to access, what other routes you currently use, and whether residents feel that this would be a good use of local council tax funds. If you have any views, for or against, please complete the online survey at https://pitstone.co.uk/path-to-college-lake/ by the end of February. If you don't have computer access and would prefer a hard copy, please email parishclerk@marsworth.co.uk or telephone 07557 289049 and we will provide a printed version.

Buckinghamshire Council has advised that it will be consulting in 2024 on its Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP) so if you are keen to see such a path installed, please keep be on the lookout for that consultation and make sure you have your say.



Old Manor changes

Conservation and restoration of The Old Manor and Old Manor Barn.

Two of Marsworth's oldest properties dating back to the early 1600s are undergoing much-needed repair works to conserve their integrity and restore many elements that will ensure their survival for decades to come. Niki and Will Ward (with their two children) and their parents Mark and Silvia Robinson moved to Marsworth in 2021 In search of quiet village life.

After falling immediately in love with Marsworth and the two buildings, they took on the daunting task of beginning the repair works and navigating the complex planning processes associated with Grade II listed properties. It took almost 18 months to achieve this, but they were delighted to begin the restoration work in late 2022.

The Old Manor began with having its roof insulated and restored and works have now commenced to repair the gable end of the house facing Church Lane. Over many years the property has undergone several repairs to try and rectify the issues to the timber frame and prevent it subsiding down the bank and into the road. Sadly, those repairs were unsuccessful, and some were even accelerating the issues. The photos show the stages of repairs to date which are now around 75% complete. Another photo gives an impression of what the exterior will look like when finished in traditional green oak and lime render.

The Old Manor Barn has undergone a somewhat different but intentional approach to restore the old but marry it with the new. It too is around 75% complete and Mark and Sylvia look forward to joining our community around April time. The works celebrate many of the original features such as the old thatched roof and simple black timber cladding, but the building will also incorporate some of the latest technologies to ensure it is highly energy efficient and suitable for modern sustainable living.

The School's vision

For many years now, we have been working on embedding our school's vision of '*Teach children how they should live, and they will remember it all their lives*' so it is rooted in everything we do, from the teaching and learning, to developing life skills and independence, to fostering the children's curiosity and supporting them on their journey to becoming respectful and compassionate young people. We are passionate about developing the whole and uniqueness of each child who attends our school. This is important for the children themselves to understand and apply. To make it easier we have created a short strapline that defines our vision. It is Learn, Live, Remember.

Swimming and parking

As many of you will be aware, the school has been taking all the children swimming every Wednesday morning for many years. We are very fortunate to be able to do this with such young children, which makes us different from most local schools. We believe that swimming is an invaluable life skill. It also teaches children about water safety and how to stay safe in a different environment to school.

The children also learn about road safety and how to stay safe using transport. Staff try to promote positive behaviour by being respectful role models. However, it is sad to announce that there have been several occasions where the children have witnessed staff and the coach driver be verbally abused with inappropriate language from drivers who haven't been able to pass straight away. I am sure you will agree this is not pleasant for all involved.

Could I please ask, that on a Wednesday morning, cars are not parked opposite the yellow zigzag lines, therefore allowing the other traffic to pass, avoiding further confrontations. I have also asked parents to do the same. Thank you for your support in this matter.

We feel this is incredibly important, given the location of the school and of our families being in close proximity to the canal and reservoirs.

Keeping roads safe this winter

When temperatures plummet, Buckinghamshire Council's trusty fleet of gritters rolls into action, salting key roads across the county to make them safer for motorists. Salt bins are also provided for people to freely use to make their roads and pavements safer during icy weather.

The bins are filled with a mixture of salt and sand and are available at multiple locations across the county for drivers and pedestrians to treat public roads and pavements in their local area. They are located in targeted areas known to be affected by icy conditions which the gritting routes don't cover.

Fly tipping penalty increase

Those caught fly-tipping in Buckinghamshire face paying a higher penalty following changes to the law which have been adopted by the council.



Earlier this year the

government increased the maximum Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) for fly-tipping from £400 to £1,000. The penalty for Failure in Householder Duty of Care has also been raised from £400 to a maximum of £600. This penalty relates to people who have waste removed by a third-party waste carrier. By law householders have a duty to check that the carrier they are using is legally authorised to carry out the work and will do so responsibly. If the waste they have given the carrier is found dumped illegally, the householder is deemed to have failed in their Duty of Care regarding their waste and can be liable for prosecution.

Fraud Awareness

The council's Fraud Team tackles housing benefit cheating, council tax scams, cybercrime and more. Losses from fraud cost taxpayers thousands of pounds yearly.

Recent action by the Fraud Team includes a joint operation with Parking Services aimed at targeting Blue Badge misuse. Investigators caught several people using expired badges or overstaying time limits in disabled parking bays. Offenders were issued a Penalty Charge Notice (PCN) for their parking contravention and sent warning letters.

Changes to household DIY waste disposal



Residents in Buckinghamshire are now able to dispose of small amounts of DIY waste for free at Household Recycling Centres (HRCs).

The changes have been brought in by central government and will make it easier for people to freely dispose of small amounts of waste created at home from DIY projects.

Following the change in law, a digital e-permit for DIY waste is now required, any resident wanting to dispose of household DIY waste at a HRC will need to have an **e-permit printed or on a portable device**.



The DIY e-permit will allow residents to dispose of one load of DIY waste each week for free. One load of DIY waste is no more than 100 litres of loose DIY waste,

or one large item no bigger than 2m x 0.75m x 0.7m such as one bathtub, one door or one kitchen unit. Staff will scan the permit and check the resident's address, after which the e-permit will expire. It can be renewed after seven days, to allow residents to dispose of another load of DIY waste for free.

Anyone wishing to dispose of more than one load of DIY waste in a week will be able to do so but will be charged, using the same price list which has been in place for the past four years.



The changes will only apply to DIY waste. Residents bringing garden waste, electricals, general and other types of waste commonly brought to HRCs will not be affected and can continue to use the sites in exactly the same way as before.

Commercial traders, landlords and residents disposing of waste produced by traders will still need to pay for commercial waste disposal.

Digital Voice - UK landlines go digital

The technology used to make land line calls is changing from analogue to digital as part of an industry-wide shift and by December 2025 most calls will be made over a broadband line.

BT is rolling out its new home phone service, Digital Voice, on a regional basis. For most customers,



it's as simple as plugging their existing home phone into the back of their broadband router rather than the socket on the wall. The new digital service provides clearer call quality and prevents most scam calls.

BT will be contacting some broadband customers in England, inviting them to switch their landlines to digital voice in advance of local and regional campaigning in their area. Most customers will be contacted four weeks before making the switch, and those customers who have disclosed any additional needs, have a healthcare pendant, no mobile signal, or only use landlines won't be proactively switched over during the initial stages of the rollout.

Ensuring no one is left behind

We understand that for many, particularly people with additional needs, the landline is a lifeline, and we want to be sure everyone remains connected.

We've established and continue to work with our Digital Voice advisory group – an association made up of charities and representative groups – who've been advising on the needs of customers most affected by the switch. Through this group we're working with organisations like the National Farmers' Union (NFU), Action with Communities in Rural England (ACRE), and Rural Services Network (RSN) to ensure rural communities get the support they need and remain connected.

Additional support and services are available, including the ability for customers to nominate a family member, friend, or carer who will receive the switching information on their behalf. When customers with additional needs start to make the switch, they'll automatically receive equipment and an engineer appointment.

For peace of mind in the event of a temporary power cut, BT will provide additional resilience to those who need it most.

BT will ensure that those without access to broadband or good mobile coverage will continue to have the connectivity they need and will contact them when they can move to Digital Voice.

New Year's Day Ramble – Monday 1st January 2024

On New Year's Day a group of ten enthusiastic walkers, comprising Marsworth residents, friends from local villages and four dogs met at All Saints Church to blow the hangovers away with a walk around the local countryside. Given the incredibly wet weather we had been subjected to over the previous couple of weeks we were all relieved to see the weather had set fair with no further rain forecast until at least that afternoon.

We set off at 11.30am and followed the canal towpath to Startops car park, then around Startops and Tringford reservoirs to the old pumping station at Little Tring. Taking the very muddy path between the fields and carefully crossing the road (with many thanks to the couple of considerate drivers who stopped and let our small party cross safely) we made our way to the Wendover Arm of the Grand Union, heading west along the towpath. The restoration team of the Wendover Canal Trust have done an excellent job of improving some 200m of the towpath and we were out of the mud for a while.

On reaching Bridge 4, which marks the canal crossing point of the old Drovers Road used historically to move animals to market in Tring, we took a short detour further along the canal to the old Whitehouses site where we discussed some of the technical issues with restoring the canal and associated infrastructure. Returning to Bridge 4 we turned down the route of the Drovers Road to the rear of Wilstone reservoir and then onwards round the reservoir to the footpath down the embankment, coming out on the B489 adjacent to

Mead's Farm Shop. We crossed the road at Wilstone Green and took the footpath besides Mead's Orchard to make our way across the fields and back to Church Lane. The walk had taken about two hours and covered roughly four miles.

Thames Water charges

Having just received my Thames Water bill two months late and far higher than any I had received before, I decided to investigate.



The meter had not been read and the bill was estimated. Thames Water are required to read meters at least once every two years. The last time my meter had been read was in April 2021.

I know that it is always open to customers to submit their own readings, but up until then the estimates had never been greatly increased from previous bills so I had not bothered, believing that this latest bill would have been following an actual reading as per their legal obligation.

I read my meter and submitted the reading. My bill had been inflated by nearly £250.

I will be interested to hear if there are others who have had a similar problem.

Death of Gary 'Pixie' Cella

Many people were shocked and saddened to hear of the death of Gary 'Pixie' Cella, who lived on a boat close to Red Lion Bridge, Marsworth. Pixie was seen on CCTV collapsing or falling into the water as he got back to his boat, *Dodona*, on Tuesday, November 28 at about 9pm. The weather had turned very cold. He was not found until Wednesday lunchtime, although many



walkers had passed within feet. One stopped to look closely, resulting in a 999 call and an alert to the pub.

Thames Valley Police has released the following statement: "Officers attended the canal near to The Red Lion public house in Marsworth on Wednesday (29/11) and very sadly located the body of a man in the water. The death is being treated as unexplained but not suspicious and a file is being prepared for the coroner. The man's next of kin have been informed and our thoughts are with them at this very difficult time."

Gary, who styled himself 'Pixie Wiccan Druid', went to Tring School and had brothers living locally. He ran a gardening and garden clearance business, Underhill Services, which received very positive reviews on Facebook. He also did some window cleaning. He was a regular at the Red Lion pub and had many friends and acquaintances in the village.

'Pixie' had recently repainted his narrowboat, which is topped by a distinctive model owl he named 'Sump Pump' – and often posted about how much he enjoyed the scenery, boating and walks on local canals.

Villagers posted tributes on *Everything Marsworth*, including: 'He was a really kind soul', and 'He was a lovely man who always had time for a chat.' Another said: 'So sad, Pixie was an absolute diamond. He did so much work on my boat when we were restoring her'.

Sadly, there have been several drownings locally over the years, often involving people who missed their footing while returning to their boats at night in the dark.

The sign was stolen last year and then recovered after a tip-off. It's a real landmark in Marsworth and marvellous news that it is back.

Canal and River Trust will be removing 26 more trees at the reservoir – on the boundary between Startops Reservoir and Ennis & Brown, Tringford Road. The reason being given is new government legislation regarding trees and reservoir banks.

The next Repair Café will be on Saturday 24th February from 9.30am to 12.30pm at Pitstone Pavilion. Bring along clothing and fabrics to mend, household items, furniture, laptops, phones, tablets and more. No charge for fixing, but donations are welcome. (See notice on page 27.)

The new Artisan Bar at Cow Roast is now open, specialising in flame-grilled food.

DUNSLEY FARM

The farm shop at Dunsley Farm, near Tring Tescos, has just had a soft reopening after the previous tenants left. It is linked with a special educational needs college in Aylesbury, which has a smallholding in Wigginton, where students learn about animal care and horticulture. The farm shop will be used to help the students learn all about the world of work, from gaining real life retail experience, to learning about customer service. The café will reopen in the spring.

Reservoir tree-felling

Protect your Pa\$\$w0rds

Home security doesn't just mean locking your doors and windows but also protecting your digital devices to keep yourself and your personal data safe.

Creating a strong password is paramount and there is a lot of information online how to do this.

Your email account should have a separate password, as this is the gateway to your other online accounts, like banking, social media and shopping. The National Cyber Security Centre recommended way is to build your password from three random non-associated words, for example 'planeliontable'. You can add numbers and

symbols to this too. It advises against words associated with you personally like pet names or numbers like your date of birth.



Another layer of security you can access is Two Factor Authentication. When you log in, as well as your password another piece of information is required, like a code that is texted to your phone. This reduces the risk of being hacked even if the cyber criminals have your password. Please be aware that scammers can now also offer codes to be used. Be suspicious! If in any doubt, ring your provider on a number you source for example from the back of your card, statement or letter and always on a different phone.

Early Police technology

Original use of technology by the Police

The telegraph was invented in the 1820s and revolutionised communication, as the Internet did in the 1990s. The first documented use of the telegraph system to solve a crime was in 1845. An operator at Paddington railway station received a message from Slough to say a suspect, wanted for the murder of his mistress by poisoning, had boarded a train bound for Paddington. He was seated in the last compartment of the second-class carriage. Unluckily for the suspect he was traveling along one of the only stretches of railway lines in the world at that time that had the telegraph lines running beside the track.

The Police were alerted and waited for the train's arrival at Paddington where the suspect was arrested. He was subsequently found guilty of the murder, thanks entirely to that telegraph message!

South East Aylesbury Link Road



Buckinghamshire Council will start work shortly on Phase 2 of the Southeast Aylesbury Link Road (SEALR) scheme.


SEALR will see the construction of 1.1 miles of dual carriageway including three new roundabout junctions designed to ease congestion in Aylesbury and provide an easier route for traffic to flow without going through the town centre. The new link road will join the A413 Wendover Road with the Stoke Mandeville Relief Road, which is being constructed by HS2.

The council is coordinating the SEALR scheme with the project moving forward in two phases. Phase 2 will connect the B4443 Lower Road to a new roundabout junction with both the Stoke Mandeville Relief Road and future South West Aylesbury Link Road.

Work recently started on Wendover Road roundabout and Phase 2 works are scheduled to start in March 2024.

The Rex Cinema, Berkhamsted

Most local people know of The Rex cinema in Berkhamsted, but if you haven't yet experienced it, it is wonderful. As if stepping back in time, it is gorgeous inside with its art deco style, and very comfortable seating with masses of leg room.



Designed in the art deco style, the cinema opened to the public in 1938. After 50 years of service it closed in 1988 and became derelict. It was totally refurbished in its original style and re-opened to the public in 2004 as a 350-seat single-screen cinema at the rear of The Gatsby bar/restaurant facing Berkhamsted High Street. The Rex shows films 362 days a year. These include latest releases, acclaimed foreign films and classics.

'The Rex has one huge screen set in a glorious 1938 art-deco proscenium with the sharpest film projection and clearest non-booming sound anywhere in the world. Throughout, its seating is big and soft. It has been called luxurious. It is better. It is civilized. It reminds us of what we have long stopped expecting from public buildings.'

Tickets are remarkably inexpensive compared with other cinemas:

Evening prices: Upstairs: £11.00/ Downstairs tables: £13.00. Concessions -£1.50 (over 60/full time student). Matinee prices: Upstairs: £6 / Downstairs tables: £7.

The next month's list goes on sale on the Saturday around a week before the end of the month at 10.30 am from the Box Office (coffee available while queuing) and from 5pm online. Programmes are available free, online, and a limited number are available at Tring Library around the first week of the month.

Drinks and snacks can be bought at the bar in the foyer and taken to your seat, or a cheese board ordered at the bar is delivered to your seat; there is also a convenient holder for your drink. Seating downstairs is laid out around small tables and

is close to the screen.

Disabled access is from the High Street and an induction loop is available.

Microscopic algae to Mammoths

We start our journey 100 million years ago as the Cretaceous seas in which thick sequences of chalk were deposited. It is the chalk bedrock which influences the distinctive landscape of the Chilterns. We shall also consider the evidence for climate change over the last 2.5 million years, before discussing the recent past and the chalk extraction in the 20th Century. Bring your binoculars and walking boots! There will be a hot drink to enjoy at the end!

The Tring Anglers

Firstly, Tring Anglers have received a bonus belated Christmas present courtesy of the Canal & River Trust fisheries team. Major works are taking place at Brent

reservoir in NW London, known as the Welsh Harp, which also feeds the Grand Union Canal. All the fish have to be removed and M.E.M Fisheries, the CRT

contractors, have delivered free of charge 1000lb* of yearling roach and bream, estimated to be 180,000 oneinch fish, to Redhouse on the Aylesbury Arm - a long pound with many areas of rushes and tree cover to maximise the fish survival rate.



The club still plan to use MEM to move fish from the Aylesbury basin in March or April and hopefully boost the fishing in the Dixon's Gap pounds.

The Welsh Harp is a Site of Special Scientific interest; sadly, unlike our own reservoir group, angling is not permitted. It will be restocked under the instruction of Natural England, though maybe not with carp and bream as these fish are not in favour with this organisation.

Serious floods have prohibited angling on our sections of the River Thame and the Thames has also suffered. As soon as it stopped raining the frost set in, which quickly reduced river levels but again made fishing difficult. The canal provided patchy sport with some bream on the Red Lion section and Redhouse winding hole. Consistent sport with plenty of bites was again at Redhouse in the rushes area beyond the winding hole. 4oz was a big roach or bream with 100 plus fish needed to win the Old Codgers and other matches. At least the float kept going down, keeping your interest level up in the cold conditions.

Any of you who fished the Aylesbury Arm over the past years, or even just walked the towpath will remember Tony Bradbury, best known as 'Tony the Hat.' Sadly he lost his fight against cancer over Christmas. He will

be sorely missed by Tring Anglers, the club he contributed to as a long-serving bailiff, coach, committee member and all round great character. It has been a privilege to have fished alongside Tony on occasion, but more often as a coach: It is impossible to count the number

of youngsters who are fishing because of his coaching. He was a natural teacher who had no formal training; he did not waste his gift - you can't ask for more than that.





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
