Another Marsworth pub to close?

Application to convert The Anglers Retreat

An application has been made for the conversion of The Anglers Retreat to a detached dwelling with associated works including demolition of existing side conservatory and replacement with single storey side extension, replacement roof to single storey rear extension and replacement windows. Demolition of existing outbuildings and erection of two detached dwellings, with associated driveway and private parking bays.

Consultation period at Buckinghamshire Council ends 26th March. Ref 24/00405/APP. *https://publicaccess.aylesburyvaledc.gov.uk/online-applications*

From the application Heritage Statement:

The proposals are to retain all the facades and roofs of the existing public house, in particular the feature checkerboard facade which will be retained and remain undisturbed. The proposal is to undertake some upgrade works around the building.

All of the existing outbuildings barring the gents' toilets will be removed as a part of the proposed conversion of the site from a public house to residential accommodation. This will help to improve the overall visual appearance of this site and the retained public house building on the approach.

The pub is unable to continue to trade as a public house. The property has been on the open market since April 2023 for a significantly lower price than similar surrounding properties and there has been no interest, no viewings, and no offers to purchase the property as a licensed premise. The owners are not able to continue to run the business indefinitely and fear the long term consequences on the asset of closing the pub if it cannot be changed to an alternative use that will preserve its history and condition for future generations.

Two planning applications have previously been submitted for the site. The first in 2005 and a further application was made in 2010. In 2021 a pre application for the conversion of the public house and surrounding land to residential accommodation was made. The proposal was to split the public house into two flats, one at ground floor and the other at first floor and undertake some additional extension works at the rear of the building at first floor in order to accommodate this. This application was withdrawn.

The proximity to the canal and reservoirs is a strong attraction and the pub is often very busy with a noticeably different clientele to the Red Lion - the remaining pub at the opposite end of the village. While the existing owners may prefer residential development to continuing operation, this is clearly not an economic necessity. We feel sure that, as recently evidenced at the Red Lion, a fresh and enthusiastic management would significantly improve the volume of business.

We do not believe the economic non-viability of the location and buildings is a valid argument in this case.

All Saints Church

We have to record the recent death of Bishop Alan, Bishop of Buckingham. Bishop Alan will be sadly missed

across the county and he was a regular visitor to the churches within our benefice. We send our heartfelt condolences to his wife and family.

By the time you receive this April newsletter Easter will be behind us. However, the church year carries on although lacking the larger festivals of other times. I have been asked on occasions about the colours used in church at certain times of the year. What is offered here is a brief explanation of when various colours are used - on altars, lecterns, pulpits and priests' apparel, notably the stole, a garment similar to a scarf, although other significant vestments such as cloaks may be worn.

Commencing at Advent, the start of the church year which leads up to the festival of Christmas, the colours purple or blue are used. These sombre colours are also used during Lent to signify the times of solemn reflection and prayer during the period leading up to the Festival of Easter. Flowers are not generally used during Advent and Lent, to continue the sombre reflections. However, over the festivals of Christmas and Easter flowers in cream, white, yellow and gold and fresh greenery appear in abundance and arrangements continue throughout the seasons, matching colours where needed. Two other colours are also used: firstly red which is used on special occasions such as saints' days, All Saints Day among others, but is also suitable for Baptisms, Ordinations and Confirmations. And secondly green, which is the colour of Ordinary Times used between the major occasions.

As you will note from the Services listing, on 18th April we will be holding the Annual Parochial Church Meeting and I do not intend to stand as Churchwarden again. I have served All Saints Church for roughly thirty years, firstly on the PCC and then as Churchwarden, and it is now time to stand back. I hope to continue for some time on the PCC helping wherever and whenever I am called upon.



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A new vision for parking across Buckinghamshire

Buckinghamshire Council has unveiled its vision and ambition for parking across the county as part of a new Parking Strategy which sets out how the service will develop in coming years.

From embracing new technology to providing customers with greater choice and flexibility and from streamlining parking charges to promoting greater safety and reducing congestion, the document starts to align the different on- and off-street parking arrangements into one strategy which covers the whole county.

Key aims within the strategy include:

- A commitment to maintaining the upkeep of quality parking provision across the county.
- Working to ensure the council's parking operations are fully self-funded as is required legally.
- Exploring ways to give people flexibility in parking options across the county.
- Intelligent use of parking enforcement to ensure effective enforcement locally and county-wide.
- A gradual transition to online/digital payments for all parking, reflecting trends in payment preferences which have accelerated in recent years, whilst maintaining cash payments for as long as economically possible in existing locations.
- Ensuring residents and customers are kept fully informed of changes.

Council investment in fixing roads

Buckinghamshire Council has pledged an extra £5 million of funding this coming year for repairs to roads across the county, adding to the £105 million already committed to the road network over the next four years.

The overall investment will go towards maintaining and improving the road network across the county, including a range of works and schemes, from the so-called 'Plane and Patch' programme, where whole sections of roads are resurfaced, to one-off large scale projects like Station Road, Cheddington and cleansing our 85,000 gullies.

As we move into warmer weather in the spring months the temporary repairs reduce in number so longer-lasting improvement works and bigger resurfacing projects can be undertaken.

Creating an age-friendly Buckinghamshire for all

Buckinghamshire Council has outlined its commitment to helping older people in Buckinghamshire live healthy, active and independent lives as set out in its Healthy Ageing Strategy. The document sets out how Buckinghamshire aspires to be a place for all residents to enjoy growing older in an age-friendly community. The strategy also includes an action plan of how the vision will be achieved.

"Healthy ageing means living a healthy and fulfilling life, being able to participate in activities and contribute to your community. It also encompasses having financial security and living in a suitable home in a safe and thriving community."

To become an age-friendly community, the strategy focuses on eight interconnecting areas outlined by the World Health Organisation (WHO):

- Outdoor spaces and buildings
- Transport
- Housing
- Participation in society
- Volunteering and employment
- Communication and information
- Community support for health and wellbeing
- Respect and social inclusion

In the first year, the focus for Buckinghamshire will be on two priorities - outdoor spaces and buildings, and participating in society.

To oversee the implementation of the strategy a multi-agency Age Friendly Bucks Partnership has been set up with external partners including the NHS and voluntary sector organisations.

To further support the success of the strategy, Buckinghamshire Council has joined the UK Network of Age Friendly Communities which is run by the Centre for Ageing Better and affiliated to the WHO's Global Network for Age Friendly Cities and Communities. Being a member of this network provides access to a range of additional resources including good practice guidance and advice. In addition, the council has partnered locally with Age UK Buckinghamshire to ensure a local focus in maintained.

Wendover Arm winding hole closure

For some time there has been water arising in the land below our Phase 1

restoration between the Little Tring stop lock and the winding hole. Responsibility for this section was handed back to CRT in 2005. Tests by CRT have so far been unsuccessful in proving where the water is coming from, or even confirming that it is canal water rather than ground water. CRT have now had to instal stop-planks in the stop-lock at Little Tring, so that the water level between the stop lock and the winding hole can be slowly lowered to help trace where the water is coming from. WCT support CRT's action in doing this because it is the best way forward.

Unfortunately, while this is done, It means that the Wendover Canal reverts to its situation before 2005. Any boat entering the Wendover Canal can only turn if they are short enough to turn at the entrance to the Tring feeder; and

since this location will not have been used much since 2005, it is likely to be more silted up than it used to be, further restricting the length of boats which can turn. The work is likely to take some time and CRT have not quoted an end date.

Question - Is it closed to boats?

Not exactly. The winding hole at the end of the navigation is unreachable behind stop planks, but certain boats may still cruise the Arm.

Is it closed to walkers, cyclists, etc using the

towpath? No. The towpath remains accessible as before (there is a diversion at Little Tring)

Reports from local organisations for the Annual Parish Meeting, 8th April 2024

Food Bank and Senior Events Report

This year has been very stable for the Marsworth Food Bank. We deliver to nine people every week and I am hugely grateful to Helena Winter-Brown, Denise Cornwall and Jenny Sheils, who look after things the odd week I am away.

Buckinghamshire Council Helping Hand team continue to support the Food Bank with grants that have provided funding for 2023 to the end of March 2024; the amount received in 2023 was £9,237. I am indebted to Jenny Sheils and Caroline Smith, who liaise with the Helping Hand team, make applications and report back to Helping Hand. The Food Bank also receives regular donations from a few residents and last year received £275 kindly donated by the Steam Rally committee. All sorts of very useful foods are regularly left in the box at All Saints and I receive boxes of both dog and cat food every week.

Peter Dean and Noble Foods generously give us sufficient boxes of eggs for everyone to have at least six a week. P.E. Mead & Son Farm Shop are also wonderfully kind in providing a large box of fruit and another of vegetables on a weekly basis.

Together this all means that those in receipt of weekly deliveries have a significant amount of their total weekly needs provided. This makes a major difference to what they have to eat and their diets are healthier than they would be otherwise.

It has become more important over the years of providing this service to Marsworth in that it has become far more than a weekly food delivery. Lisa has frequently been called upon to help them when they have injured themselves or are not well, and her nursing expertise and natural caring manner is loved by them all. We have also been able to offer help in providing a new cooker for one when theirs had stopped working. In this I was yet again grateful to Caroline Smith, for liaising with Buckinghamshire Council's Helping Hand team. Additional help is given, when asked for, in dealing with forms, bills and other household administrative problems, which is most gratefully received.

In May we were able to host a special afternoon tea on the recreation ground as part of the village celebration for King Charles' coronation. For this we were indebted to the kindness of Mike and Rebecca Foxcroft, who generously donated the teas individually boxed so that everyone's individual tastes were catered for. Prosecco was provided to make a toast to our new king.

Yet again Helena, Lisa and I were able to put on a Christmas lunch for 32 of our seniors with generous funding from a local couple. To organise this event we had amazing help from a number of people in the village, who prepared the vegetables and two who kindly cooked the roast potatoes in their ovens. Tesco and M&S in Tring and Waitrose in Aylesbury all donated a wide range of food and the Marsworth Charity also gave a donation. Entertainment was provided by the Anna Swannell and her ladies choir, and Father Christmas (Paul Barber) gave out presents to everyone. There was also a free raffle with prizes for all and super table decorations could be taken home by those who asked for them. The food was superb. This lunch has become an important part of Christmas to many, particularly those who would be spending the day itself on their own.

All financial donations and payments are administered by All Saints Church who provide financial governance for the Food Bank and Senior events, where applicable this means that donations can be gift aided adding 25% to the donation.

Marsworth Community Speedwatch

As we approach the first day of Spring, we leave behind a period of reduced activity for the Speedwatch volunteers as a result of Christmas/New Year commitments, reduced daylight hours and appalling wet weather. Added to this, the Sentinel equipment required some replacement components which rendered it unusable for an extended period. These issues also affected the operations of Speedwatch in surrounding villages.

Activity has now resumed in Marsworth and has initially focused on the traffic in both directions on Lower Icknield Way. During a two-hour period in which traffic was monitored for one hour in each direction, no vehicles were recorded exceeding the speed limit out of a total of 424 vehicles monitored.

Ideally, this result would be attributed to those drivers who act responsibly and those who are deterred from breaking the speed limit due to the signs advising that Speedwatch operates within the village. However, there may have been other factors for vehicles not exceeding the 30 mph limit.

The appalling condition of the roadway on the White Lion bridge and on each of its approaches causes drivers to drive more carefully and slowly.

The volume of traffic is higher at the moment as a result of the diversions in place whilst the Upper Icknield Way is closed. This limits the opportunities for some to 'put their foot down'.

The continued parking of a vehicle on the road close to the village hall causes traffic in both directions to slow and/or stop, as it is located on a bend and is a potential hazard. With the increasing number of daylight hours and less wet weather as spring and summer arrive, it should be possible to evidence that from time to time, Speedwatch will be operating at all five nominated sites within the village. With this in mind, we would welcome more volunteers who are prepared to give up a few hours each month to encourage safer speeds throughout Marsworth. Once set up, the tripod mounted video camera automatically records speeding vehicles and the information is passed to Thames Valley Police. Operators of the equipment are not involved in any follow up action.

Marsworth Charity Report 2024

The Charity Trustees have had one meeting during the last 12 months. An annual report is submitted each year to The Charity Commission in accordance with Charity regulations.

Our objectives are to apply the income of the Charity for such charitable purposes for the general benefit of the inhabitants of the Parish of Marsworth as the Trustees think fit. During the year we have had two requests for help, one of which was from the Marsworth Food Bank to support the Christmas Lunch for the older members of the village and the Trustees agreed to donate £100 for this purpose which has helped 32 people from the village. The other request was from the Marsworth School which we will be considering at our forthcoming Trustees Meeting. We have agreed with the Parish Council to work together if a project is identified that the Charity can assist with.

A major part of our time this year has been spent in going through the Parish Council records, the (former) AVDC records and working with the Charity Commission, trying to identify the history and legal title to the Gravel Pit Meadow which goes back to the Marsworth Inclosure Act 1809. I would very much like to thank Stephen Wooler for his recent research and work on this which is on-going.

In the meantime we continue to receive our income from our farm tenant of the Gravel Pit Meadow and our capital fund gradually grows.

Home burglaries

Unfortunately, Thames Valley is seeing a rise in burglaries and Buckingham Council Community Safety Team have issued the following simple steps to protect your home and reduce the chances of it becoming the next target.





- Don't leave your home in darkness. Invest in a timer switch for lamps or your TV. Perhaps purchase a simulated TV device, which has an array of 12 coloured LEDs that imitates the light patterns of watching TV. Someone eyeing up your blinds or curtains will see moving changing colours behind it, like you'd get from a TV. Available for under £20.
- Keep valuables out of sight and mark them with your house number and postcode using a UV pen.
- Register your valuables for free via the Immobilise webpage (www.immobilise.com) and keep an inventory list.
- If you have jewellery at home, photograph it for insurance purposes and consider storing in a suitable safe.
- Lock your doors and windows remove all keys from locks and keep them out of reach.
- If you're going away on holiday, cancel any deliveries, set alarms and do not post on social media.
- Look out for your neighbours' houses, especially when they're not at home.

Local Treasures

A local gem is the Natural History Museum at Tring.

Steve and I recently re-visited the Museum in Akeman Street, Tring. We decided to go outside of school holidays but even so there were a couple of school visits taking place; it was very busy and somewhat noisy,



but the children seemed to be interested in the exhibits and the project papers they had been given to work through. It is preferable to book before you attend as only a limited number of walk-in spaces are available - and perhaps check if there is a school visit taking place!

Although some classes of exhibits (e.g. much of the butterfly collection) have been moved out of Tring over the years, the remaining exhibition is substantial with many curious objects - the dressed fleas from Mexico always delight. Although the Museum is criticised as a classic Victorian collection of dead animals, many were preserved and stuffed only after they'd died naturally.

The Annual Wildlife Photographer of the Year exhibition was running at the time we went and the photographs were of excellent quality and the children's prints stunning. If planning a visit, it would be worthwhile to see if there were any special programmes coming up.

A generous bequest

Walter Rothschild had a lifelong interest in the natural world and undertook, or sponsored, a wide range of research projects. When he died in 1937 he left his

A new Traditional May event in lvinghoe

New Moon Morris will be holding a Maypole Dance on Ivinghoe Village Green from 7.30 - 8.30pm on Tuesday 30th April. Everyone is welcome, there will be Maypole dancing and Morris dancing from New Moon Morris. We hope that we will be joined by another Morris side.

Afterwards there will be tea/coffee in the lvinghoe Town Hall until 9.00.

How did the idea come about?

One of our musicians. Russ, was researching the history of folk and Morris dancing in lvinghoe, and

found that while there is no previous tradition of a Morris side, there is a history of a Morris tune, and Morris dance.

The tune "Buckinghamshire Poacher" was collected by R. Puddyfoot from George Paradine, a shepherd who lived in lvinghoe and worked on the Beacon. George is buried in the churchyard in lvinghoe. The tune was taken by Eynsham Morris who developed the dance

remaining research collections, the public museum, its contents and the surrounding land to the Natural History Museum in London. His collection is the biggest private natural history collection ever assembled by one

person, and the largest bequest of specimens ever received by the Natural History Museum. Walter's butterfly collections were later moved to London, and Tring then became home to the bird research collection which is largely housed in a new, specialist building behind the Akeman Street car park. Today, Museum staff working at Tring look after more than a million bird specimens, nests and eggs. Researchers from around the world travel to Tring to use this important collection.

There is a Museum car park in Akeman Street (currently closed for maintenance works) and free car parking in two car parks off Hastoe Lane. The first one, closest to the Museum, has 48 spaces, including three blue badge holder spaces and two parent-and-toddler spaces.


- Redrow's Appeal Rejected

This application for the development of 1400 houses on land between Bulbourne Road and Station Road went to appeal, subsequently to Public Enquiry and latterly to the Secretary of State (The Rt Hon Michael Gove MP) for a final decision.

The Secretary of State has dismissed the Appeal and refused planning permission. However, this is not the end as there are still circumstances in which the validity of the Secretary of State's decision may be challenged by making an application to the High Court within six weeks of 15 March 2024. A judicial review is not a re-hearing, so the judges cannot substitute their own view for that of the Inspector but only check that the Secretary of State's decision has been arrived at through correct legal process.

From the Marsworth Archive

Marsworth's oldest resident

News of Kitty Pinnock's 105th birthday in February (see page 7) prompted an enquiry to the Archive as to whether Kitty is the oldest inhabitant in the records of the village. This is the kind of challenge the Archive thrives on, and we set to work scouring the available records to see if we could find the answer.

Alongside parish records, the obvious source to consult are the surveys of the National Census and, as we wrote in our previous article, Marsworth can take pride in being mentioned in the country's first census – the Domesday Book of 1086. The modern census, which is now run by the Office for National Statistics, dates back to 1801 when the government, worried that there might not be enough food to feed the country, passed the Census Act to establish the size of the population. One of the key questions asked in the early surveys was age and the 1821 census showed that almost half the population was under 20 years old, compared with around a quarter today.

But finding out the age of the population was tricky, as people were often reluctant to tell the truth. The Office of National Statistics writes "The 1881 Census report found a great deal of 'wilful misstatement of age' by girls and women, mostly depending on whether they were married. Even much later, in 1951, women were asked to be more honest about how old they were." This is hardly surprising given that the early census instructions read "For persons aged 15 years and upwards it is sufficient to state within what period of five years their age is, writing down the lowest number of that period: thus for persons aged 15 and under 20, write 15 - for 20 and under 25, write 20 ... but the exact age may be stated if the person prefers it."

1841 saw the first 'modern' census, led by the General Registrar 'Mr Lister', with forms filled out by households directly and it is the first census for which we have records in the Marsworth Archive. According to it, the eldest resident was Sicily Crop, aged 80, who lived in

the household of Joseph and Elizabeth Chappin. Joseph is listed as a publican, and we are guessing he ran The Red Lion.

Looking through the records there are no references to any centenarians other than Catherine Bushell, who passed away aged 100 in 2020, having lived her later years at New Mill and then in a nursing home. We are indebted to Elsie Beesley for alerting us to Dick Duff and Hazel O'Connor, both of whom were aged 99. So, unless anyone has any other information, we are happy to proclaim Kitty as Marsworth's oldest resident and wish her many more years with the title!

An interesting read

Moving to Marsworth from the city of St Albans has brought us to rural village life, a change of pace and scale, with a stronger sense of community. Villages are often sought out by weary city commuters who seek sanctuary, space and peace and are treasured by those with a sense of nostalgia, connecting with the past and resisting the fast-changing world beyond, even if original inhabitants of rural communities would view it more realistically.

There are many homages to rural life in literature and it appears that nostalgia and a reticence for change prevail through the works of authors such as H E Bates. Perhaps the most famous book of this type is *Lark Rise to Candleford* by Flora Thompson, which is set in Oxfordshire/Buckinghamshire in the 19th century and has been made into a play at the National Theatre and a BBC Television series.

You might be interested in another two books, one dating from the 1930s at a time of great rural nostalgia as the clouds of war thickened over Europe, and a more modern work set in equally threatening times for residents of Buckinghamshire.


Portrait of a Village by


Francis Brett Young was published in 1937 and describes life in the fictional village of Monks Norton.

The author focuses on a dispassionate description of village life, detailing it through geography and hierarchy in order to note the changes of the 1930s – it describes the saddler whose livelihood has been threatened by the onset of the bicycle and car, embodied by the garage down the street. Now his trade is in making leather collars for pets.

Only one individual gets an entire

chapter – the village doctor (the author had been a doctor) – who is something of an unsung hero in the community. He is '*kind and honest and wise and courageous and merciful ... it would be difficult in Monks Norton to find a more happy man.*'








With its rural setting and themes of change, the novel might appeal to residents of Marsworth who might see a lot of village life (and ourselves) in its pages. The early editions also have wonderful woodcuts.

The Country of Larks: A Chiltern Journey: In the footsteps of Robert Louis Stevenson and the footprint of HS2 by Gail Simmons (2019).

This is a travelogue in which the author revisits Buckinghamshire, the county of her childhood, as it falls beneath the shadow of HS2. She follows in the footsteps of Robert Louis Stevenson who undertook his own three-day walk from High Wycombe to Tring via Great Missenden and Wendover and describes the changes in the landscape of the last 150 years, as well as talking to residents living with the prospect of destruction of the fabric of their area.



It is a moving book that we can all relate to as we will recognise her journey; and for those lacking in a rural background It helps to interpret the landscape around us. For anyone who has a love of the countryside and wants to know more about its evolution and (sadly) what has been lost from the past and in the future, this is an excellent read.

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
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
